Cultural Arts Grant Applications

The following 14 organizations have applied for Cultural Art Grants for the FY 2018-19:

(1) <u>African-American Cultural Society, Inc. (AACS)</u> is celebrating 27 years of service and continues to provide the community of Palm Coast—particularly the youth—with programs and activities that reveal the history and culture of people of African descent and factual information about the Diaspora experience. They plan to continue to present cultural exhibits, participate in town festivals, celebrations and center-based programs.

Request for Funds \$3000.00

- *This request is for their <u>Kwanza Program</u> 12/26/2018-01/01/2019 which takes place at the AACS Center, US 1. This program depicts the "seven principles" and the first harvest celebration of Africa during these 7 days.
- *Youth Black History Reality Program enables youth of the community to study and re-enact significant prominent African Americans and their contribution to history in a theatrical program format. Will be held at the AACS Center the 3rd Sunday in February during Black History Month, 4 to 7 p.m.
- *AACS Center Exhibit Professional Display which includes leasing a traveling exhibit with 10 panels highlighting African American contributions to American culture through photos, DVD's, narratives. Takes place February-March 2019.
- *Juneteenth Program is an indoor/outdoor program at the AACS Center held 1-2 days in June 2019 to commemorate the ending of slavery in the U.S.
- (2) <u>Afro American Caribbean Heritage Organization (AACHO)</u> has been a cultural organization in Flagler County for 36 years and they host a display at the Flagler County Public Library each February. They serve as role models and mentors for youth, host fun-filled trips, work with other

community organizations, and award modest scholarships to deserving college-bound high school graduates. They participate in local parade and community holiday gatherings and all are welcome to join their band on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 5 p.m. (except July & August) at Island Walk Shopping Center, Realty Exchange Meeting Room off of Florida Park Drive.

Request for Funds \$1,000.00

They wish to offer a <u>Stipend of Appreciation of \$100 each to 10 individuals or groups</u> for their efforts, talents, participation, benefitting their annual festival.

(3) Choral Arts Society (CAS) has been in existence since 1999 and is open to all qualified musicians. All of their concerts are held at the St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Palm Coast and open to the public without charge. They provide a \$500 annual scholarship to 1 or more college bound students to study music performance and/or education.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

Their purpose is to enrich the cultural life of our residents by bringing the best choral music to Palm Coast and the Flagler area and encourage the pursuit of music in young people through annual scholarships. They perform 3 concerts throughout the FY year as follows:

- December 2018 Christmas season 2 performances
- May 2019 Broadway stage pieces 2 performances
- July 2019 Patriotic favorites July 4th 1 performance
- (4) <u>City Repertory Theatre</u> was created to provide alternative programs and entertainment as a unique resource to the community and seek out and give the opportunity to local students for training and instruction.

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Request for Funds \$3,000.00

The FY 2018-19 season will include:

- The Rocky Horror Show, Oct. 5-28, 2018
- Proof, November 9-18, 2018
- The Women, January 10-13, 2019
- The Taming of the Shrew, Feb. 21-24, 2019
- Dames at Sea, April 5-14, 2019
- Hand to God, May 3-10, 2019

They are currently developing an evening of African-American poetry that hopefully will be presented during Black History Month in February 2019. They have previously touched on subjects such as battered women and mental illness. All productions are presented at 160 Cypress Point Parkway in an intimate, jewel-box theatre which seats 45-65 people with 5-12 performances. Taming of the Shrew, however, will be presented in the tent next to the PCAF Center with 4 performances.

(5) <u>Columbian Club of Flagler County</u> has served the community over 30 years.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

They would like to have a one day "Columbus Day Indoor Picnic" event held inside, due to the Florida heat. The Club will prepare a dinner buffet with music provided by Mike Kohn. Also demonstrations, and speakers that explain the cultural and historical impact Christopher Columbus had on our new world will be provided.

This will include arts and crafts, along with a historical presentation from a history professor from Daytona State College about Christopher Columbus and his adventures.

(6) <u>Community Chorus of Palm Coast</u> was founded in 2010 and has 66 members from Palm Coast and the surrounding area, including youth members. The concerts are held in the sanctuary of the Trinity Presbyterian Church in Palm Coast. The mission of the Chorus is to build a tradition

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of community pride through choral excellence by providing performances that enrich, educate and entertain through a variety of musical styles, including Broadway, pop, folk, sacred, gospel and classical music.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

The concerts for FY 2018-19 are as follows:

- Veteran's Day November 12, 2018
- Winter Concert Friday, November 30, 2018
- Winter Concert Sunday, December 2, 2018
- Spring Concert Friday, April 26, 2019
- Spring Concert Sunday, April 28, 2019
- Memorial Day Monday, May 2, 2019

Performances are free to the public. By invitation, last FY, the Chorus participated in two community celebrations including the Veteran's Day Ceremony at Heroes Park and the Memorial Day Ceremony also at Heroes Park.

(7) Family Matters of Flagler has been in existence since 1998, and in 1999 they assisted the City of Palm Coast by helping them establish their first parks and recreation programming by working in partnership to obtain a five year Federal juvenile justice delinquency grant for \$100,000 a year for 5 years. This award funded the creation and operation of the Flagler Youth Center. They are a very active advocacy organization and have started programs such as Focus on Flagler Youth Coalition, the Palm Coast Historical Society, the Flagler Chapter of the Boys and Girls Club, YMCA, etc.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

Current initiatives include a senior employment program where they train and place seniors at "not for profits" or government agencies to upgrade their skills to reenter the workforce. They acquired a licensed food truck that they bring to community events to raise funds and deliver the message that "Seniors Matter." Their goal is to provide services in their own

facility to serve food and accommodate the 300 plus seniors who want to socialize. Their newest initiative is called "Seniors on a Mission" where seniors are brought together to assist as volunteers when requested by the City of Palm Coast or other organizations.

(8) <u>Flagler Auditorium</u> is a performing arts organization for the residents of Palm Coast for the past 27 years. They would like to continue to offer quality and varied programming to the community at affordable prices, support arts in education, provide grants and scholarships, and nurture arts and culture throughout the community.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

The FY 2018-19 projected season is as follows: (See Attachment A)

(9) <u>Flagler County Art League (FCAL)</u> was established in 1978 and boasts a membership of more than 480 artists and art lovers. Their mission is to promote the arts in our community and create an environment for artists to develop, collaborate and showcase their work, particularly in our schools.

Requests for Funds \$3,000.00

In its 4th year, FCAL's "Art Works" is a collaboration between FCAL and Flagler Palm Coast High School faculty that offers students who want to pursue a career in the arts an opportunity to interact with former graduates of FPC who have successful art careers. There will be presentations and workshops. The program this year will be held on March 19, 2019 and they expect more than 150 students to attend. The keynote speaker is an administrator at Full Sail University.

(10) Flagler Performing Arts Academy provides a summer theater camp for ages 8 to 18 teaching dance, voice and acting training; and in the last fiscal year provided 40 children with a 3 week professional, quality musical theater training. Additionally, over 400 residents were able to enjoy the magic of a high quality theatrical experience. They would like to offer this to more youth on a sliding fee schedule for families that are unable to pay even the discounted \$200 fee for their 3 week camp. They would also like to provide honorariums to students who work behind the scenes, which would enable them to have summer employment and teach them valuable stagecraft skills. They hope to have 4 performances in the new fiscal year.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

The camp is scheduled for June 10-28, 2019 and the theater performances that are scheduled are for June 28, 2019 and June 29, 2019 from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m.

(11) The Garden Club at Palm Coast, Inc. will host their annual Spring Festival & Plant Sale at Central Park at Palm Coast Town Center or Flagler Palm Coast High School on Saturday, April 6, 2019 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

They will present 15 demonstrations and informational classes throughout the day on (1) floral design, (2) Florida native plants, (3) propagation techniques, (4) cooking with herbs, (5) butterfly gardens, (6) art demonstrations (with invitations to the Flagler County Art League) and (7) vendors to participate in demonstrations.

Their purpose is "to aid in the protection and conservation of plants, birds, trees, air and water; to stimulate knowledge and a love of horticulture and floral design; to educate and participate in environmental affairs and to encourage 'civic pride'."

(12) <u>Gargiulo Art Foundation, Inc.</u> supports artists, students, art organizations and have recognized 18 Flagler County Artists of the Year. They have sponsored numerous varied art shows, artists' panels, discussions, art receptions, gallery walks, critiques, student art scholarships and developed Palm Coast's "Art in Public Places."

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

The Foundation is advertising a proposed public sculpture garden in Town Center and committing \$100,000 over the next 4 years for this project, headed up by well-known Deland Sculptor Harry Messersmith. Their goal is to have at least half a dozen sculptures installed around Town Center Lake by the year 2021 to enhance nature, art and wellness benefiting residents, businesses, visitors, and tourists.

(13) Palm Coast Arts Foundation established in 2004 focuses on bringing quality entertainment and cultural arts to our community. They have designed and are building a Center for the Arts that will establish the Palm Coast/Flagler Beach areas as a world-class forum for the arts so as to nurture and spotlight the arts and economy by providing vision, venues, and facilitation of all types of performances including Broadway to Opera, music of all genres, dance and theater.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

Last year's MacBeth sold out each night and in February 2019, their Shakespeare in the Park production of "The Taming of the Shrew" hopes to be as well received during the 4 performances.

(14) Palm Coast United Methodist Church is an outreach ministry presenting programs for the enjoyment, education and personal enrichment of the greater Palm Coast community while supporting multi-cultural performing artists in interactive relationships.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

(See Attachment B for a list of the FY 2018-19 Concert Series).

(15) Pan Afrakan Dance & Music Historical Ed. Association was organized as an educational tax-exempt organization in August 2002. The purpose of the organization is to preserve diverse community activities within folk and cultural traditions of African-Caribbean & indigenous historical understanding, thought, sacred philosophy and social organizations in turn using these activities to strengthen behavioral concepts, increase learning development, and focus on building collaborative and improved communities in the humanities of Arts, Sciences, Cultural Dance & Music within residential programs, seminars and workshops for all age groups.

Request for Funds \$3,000.00

Their program would like to preserve and educate African-Caribbean Arts, Dance, and Music in the local Palm Coast Community.

They would like to have 100 master classes and performances at \$15 each and an additional 8 dance classes at \$62.50 per hour and 8 drumming classes at \$57.50 per hour.

In doing so, the African American Cultural Society has often been recognized for its contributions in serving the community through its programs and events that perpetuate and embellish its mission.

Describe the purpose of the program being considered for funding: The "AACS Annual Cultural Arts Series" consists of programs that educate, enlighten, enrich and entertain the City of Palm Coast Community on the unique arts and history of the African American community and African Diaspora. Although we encourage donations and contributions, they fall short of enabling the AACS to sometimes present a full program of the event and at times we may have to defer the program for that year.

"CULTURAL ARTS SERIES" DESCRIPTION - 2018/2019

KWANZAA PROGRAM – offers the general public an opportunity to be informed on the history and cultural significance of this African American Holiday Season that celebrates family, community and culture. It is celebrated from December 26 thru January 1 and it takes its name from the first harvest celebrations of Africa. The seven days are highlighted by ceremonies depicting seven communitarian African values, commonly referred to as the "Seven Principles." Namely, Umoja (Unity), Kujichagulia (Self-Determination), Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility), Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics), Nia (Purpose), Kuumba (Creativity), and Imani (Faith). Our program generally encompasses 1-2 days but includes the celebration of each of the seven principles. This takes place with the tenants of each principle being explained by speakers (in-house and guest performers) supplemented with appropriate props and exhibits. All of the events take place at the AACS Center on US#1, Palm Coast. (Public attendance is expected to be 150-175.) Planning is now underway to format this year's program. Budget requirements are attached.

YOUTH BLACK HISTORY REALITY PROGRAM — enables the youth of our community to study and reenact significant prominent African Americans and their contributions to American history in a theatrical program format. They dress in costume and use various props to highlight their presentation of that person. A lot of rehearsing and the time of AACS volunteers are required to prepare for this event. A guest performer may also be engaged to further enhance the program. This program is offered to the general public at the AACS Center, US#1, Palm Coast. It is generally held the third Sunday in February (Black History Month) from 4 pm to 7 pm and the program generally exceeds "capacity turnout" from the community (over 250). To see our youth extolling the virtues of various African American heroes they have been taught to know or being exposed to for the first time is very memorable to everyone. The youth are recruited from our schools, churches, clubs and AACS member families. Because of the size of the audience, a light fare is offered at the end for fellowship and cordiality. Budget requirements are attached.

AACS CENTER EXHIBIT DISPLAY- Leasing a professional Traveling Exhibit display with approximately 10 panels to highlight African American contributions to American culture. Each panel tells a story on a famous historical African American through photos and written narratives and is supported by DVD/Audio commentary. The exhibit will be displayed over a Four (4) week period during February - March 2019. The exhibit will be open to the public (donations only) and special arrangements made with cultural groups in the school system and other organizations will be extended. This is a first time venture for the AACS to present an extended program to the community that allows flexibility for viewing over a period of time. The AACS plans to expand its normal operations to provide access to view the exhibit on a daily basis. Projected attendance is expected to exceed 700.

JUNETEENTH PROGRAM – is an indoor/outdoor program at the AACS Center set in a festival style format to commemorate the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, the Union soldiers landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and all slaves were now free, even though this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. Our program includes interactive children activities as well as informational speakers on the occasion, music performances, exhibits, artifacts, artwork, books, and light food sales. The program is held over 1-2 days in June and attracts a sizable following from community patrons and members. (Public attendance is expected to be 150-200) "Juneteenth" has gained in popularity nationwide and is a program that must be featured as a National African American Historical event. Budget requirements are attached.







July 5, 2018 Michael Moore, Capitalism: A Love Story. This film examines the impact of corporate dominance on the everyday lives of Americans (and by default, the rest of the world). The film moves from Middle America, to the halls of power in Washington, to the global financial epicenter in Manhattan. With both humor and outrage, the film explores the question: What is the price that America pays for its love of capitalism? Families pay the price with their jobs, their homes and their savings. Moore goes into the homes of ordinary people whose lives have been turned upside down; and he goes looking for explanations in Washington, DC and elsewhere. What he finds are the all-too-familiar symptoms of a love affair gone astray: lies, abuse, betrayal...and 14,000 jobs being lost every day. Capitalism: A Love Story also presents what a more hopeful future could look like. Who are we and why do we

behave the way that we do?—This film satirizes the world before Obama's presidency; it is again very much apropos to today where we seem to go back to the pre-Obama days.

Beginning September 13, 2018—Trevor Noah, Afraid of the Dark—Trevor Noah's Netflix

one hour standup special. Amazing comedy covering race in America, immigration politics, international relations and more. The comedy has had mixed reviews. One viewer comment: I love Trevor Noah, and this special was funny, but I have to agree with fellow reviewers about the anti-white racism. It's not funny to make jokes about white people always being racist, because not only



is it an old joke, it's also a little unfair. There are a lot of good white ppl out there, not everyone is out to get you. The Obama joke carried on far too long, the pussy joke seemed a little too manufactured, and the james bond joke got me feeling that Trevor Noah may be a little insecure, and jokes like these help him deal with it. Overall it seemed like a half-hearted script, but ain't no denying that the delivery was quite good and funny.—Come to make up your own mind about this comedy special from Netflix. If you have Netflix at home, take a look there; if you don't, see whether you might not want to subscribe to it.

There will be no film on September 20, the third Thursday in September.



September 27, 2018—Maya Angelou: And Still I Rise [on loan from Ms. Joyce McLaren] A viewer's review: This is a definitive film about an American icon. It is beautifully crafted and surprisingly immersive and emotional, touching on themes of race, language, civil rights and creativity among many others. Beyond being an entertaining and comprehensive exploration of a fascinating life, it shall correctly be considered "important," especially for these times. The film was accepted to Cannes, has won multiple festival awards, and deserves Oscar nomination. Not only is it the result of a successful first-time collaboration between Co-Directors Bob Hercules and Rita Coburn Whack, it is the most ambitious documentary (of many strong ones) produced by Media Process Group. The long creative partnership

between Hercules and acclaimed cinematographer Keith Walker is on full display in this big feature doc, anchored by gorgeous interviews with a large cast of notables (including Maya Angelou, Cicely Tyson, Oprah Winfrey, Bill and Hillary Clinton, Quincy Jones, Louis Gossett Jr., and many others) and backed by a thorough array of exceptional archival footage and rare still images. I highly recommend it.

Describe the Purpose of the Organization

The Choral Arts Society was founded by, and is still directed, by Cheryl Robinson. The Choral Arts Society has been in existence since 1999. We are a community organization open to all qualified musicians. The members are dedicated musicians who participate because of their love of choral music. They purchase their own music, and pay annual membership dues.

Our board members provide various talents beyond music to include banking, business, accounting, education, medicine and technology which provides excellent inside management for our group.

All concerts are held in St. Thomas Episcopal Church, and are open to the public, without charge (however a free will donation is requested). Donations, dues from members of the chorus, together with the Grant from the City of Palm Coast, and a Grant from Flagler County are the organizations sole sources of revenue to keep the organization operating.

Our purpose is two-fold: 1) to enrich the cultural life of our residents, by bringing the best choral music to Palm Coast and the Flagler County area, and 2) to encourage the pursuit of music in our young people through annual scholarship. The Choral Arts Society provides a \$500 annual scholarship to one or more college bound student(s) to study music performance and/or education. At the present time we are providing one to two such scholarships to a Flagler County recipient depending upon our financial ability.

Describe the purpose of the Program being considered for funding

The Choral Arts Society performs three concerts during the year, in December, May and July. Previous year's attendance for the 3 concerts was 1339 persons. The concerts for fiscal 2017-2018 were held on December 1 and December 3, 2017; May 18 and May 20, 2018; and July 4, 2018. The December concert ushers in the Christmas season; the May concert is a selection of Broadway stage pieces; and the July concert celebrates the holiday with patriotic favorites. As indicated, there are two performances of each concert, with the exception of the one performance on July 4th.

The funds from the grant will be used to offset the cost of printing newsletters, programs, postage, advertising and promotion, and creation, enhancement, and maintenance of our web-site.



Except for TAMING OF THE SHREW, all productions will be presented in our intimate jewel-box theatre at 160 Cypress Point Parkway. Our infinitely adaptable "black box" space allows us to reconfigure our playing area to fit each individual show, with seating varying from 45 to 65. Depending on the production, shows will have between 5 and 12 performances. SHREW will be presented in the tent next to the PCAF Center for four performances.

City Repertory Theatre is unique not merely in Palm Coast, but in all of Central Florida. No other company presents such a diversity of material - including many regional premieres - with as fine a company of actors. CRT remains formally a community theatre, since none of our actors are paid. However, last year with the help of PCAF we were able to give a small stipend to the cast of *Macbeth* and hope to do so again. Still, an impressive number of our performers and creative staff have significant professional credits. They choose to work at CRT because of our challenging repertoire, unique productions and our dedication to quality.

We have an extremely loyal audience, many of who return show after show and even rearrange their travel schedules to avoid missing anything we present. We continue to use our marketing efforts to attract tourists and regional visitors to our theater and to Palm Coast, bringing regular customers from both the Daytona Beach and St. Augustine areas to many productions each year.

3. If awarded, describe how the City of Palm Coast's financial assistance will be used and why funding from the City is essential for development of the program.

CRT has always depended primarily on its audience members and subscribers. Today with state and national government funding continuing to dwindle, we must rely even more heavily on our supporters, our volunteer staff and our Board of Directors. Funding from the City of Palm Coast is an important adjunct that makes our programs possible.

We remain especially happy with our partnership with the Palm Coast Arts Foundation. Although producing Shakespeare requires recruiting additional actors and increases technical requirements, these special productions increase both our outreach and our ability to serve Palm Coast.


A grant from the City of Palm Coast would be used for two distinct purposes:

First – To continue to market the theater and reach out to local and regional customers who, even after our seven-year history, may remain unaware of the cultural opportunities that await them at City Repertory Theatre.

Second – To defray some production costs, especially those created by our unusual repertoire. Our single greatest production expense remains mandatory rights, royalty payments and script rental fees; we must contract with the various rights holders in order to present the classic and modern plays we bring to the people of Palm Coast. With assistance from the City of Palm Coast in defraying these expenses, more of our budget can be used to improve our minimal sets, costumes, and lighting. While our intimate setting does not accommodate elaborate productions, additional funds allow us to improve and develop our entire program, strengthening the theater's ability to grow and serve the community.

Expression Magazine sat down for a brief conversation with co-founder of City Repertory Theatre John Sbordone, unfortunately co-founder Diane Ellertson couldn't attend.

Expression: You have one of the strangest places to present a show that I've seen.



John: It's very typical of off-Broadway venues in many major cities. You find a space that will work, fix it up and make do. Back in the day they'd go to the back of the barn and put on a show. The size does limit some of the things we can do.

Expression: And yet your following is so loyal.

John: Well, we do things that other people won't do, edgier material. Past president Brett Cunningham described CRT as the gutsiest place in Palm Coast. An example of one of those shows is "Venus in Fur."



Expression: Some of the offerings are very well known, some perhaps outré, for example the Valentine's day offering of "Love Letters", followed by "The Forgotten Women's Project," the language of abuse

"We're doing the preview so the kids will have a chance to see what it is that they have because they don't get a chance to see 'Macbeth' very often," said Sbordone. "It's very important to share this (with the students). This is what CRT is all about — getting high quality, different kinds of things in front of Flagler County audiences.

Acting I student, was looking for ways to improve her own stage skills.

"It's exciting," she said.
"It's helping me learn how to grow, speak up to the audience when I'm performing

and move around the stage freely."

A blood knot is the joining of two different lines to create one, and the upcoming performance of Athol Fugard's play "Blood Knot" is an illustration of two very different men and the singular relationship that binds them.

Exploring the complex dynamics of familial relationships, Fugard's piece, written in 1961 as "The Blood Knot," takes audiences on a journey of the heart, mind and soul during one of South Africa's most challenging periods — apartheid and the ramifications of segregation and perception.

Returning home from traveling abroad, Morris reunites with Zachariah after their mother dies, bringing with him the big dreams fostered during his travels.

"Morris has all of these ideas and plans — we're going to save money, we're going to get a fann, have a schedule — but the reality is Zach realizes what the

situation really is while Morris has all of these pipe dreams," said Fagundes, who takes on the role of Morris.

The seeming impossibility of those dreams hold Zachariah a prisoner of reality, from home and land ownership to female companionship, but he is willing to live vicariously through the opportunities his brother creates.

"Brothers, people, have complex relationships. It's very human in a lot of ways," said Fagundes. "You start out and have ideas of what you think the relationship is, for the next hour-and-a-half you have your ideas change and evolve."

charge, a woman of faith whose faith has always been challenged and she's trying so hard to make it what she wants it to be, what she hopes it is. She is Catholic and very intellectual."

Working alongside Howell is Conard as Sister Agnes, who has been charged with

manslaughter and who leads the audience into hermemories while under hypnosis. Conard honed her skills on stages across

the region.

"She's a really unique character," Conard said of Agnes. "She's very complicated and fairly difficult

to play because there is an innocence about her. I think the most challenging part for me is it's emotionally exhausting."

Portraving the analytical psychiatrist who's struggling to make the connection between science and faith. Trulio as Martha Livingston calls into question the gap between those things that must be seen to be believed versus those taken on faith.

"She is very professional and sure of herself. science-based and not interested in religion," said Trulio, whose character also serves as the story's narrator. "It's not so much about belief as an analytical point of view and I think we have to make room in our life for that. It's the message

I hope people take away. I've seen the play and the movie done a long time ago and it's a fascinating problem to untie as an actor, that journey."

The timing of the Mav 4 opening with a finale on May 13 - Mother's Day is not lost on Sbordone.

"This is our special Mother's Day show - we advertise it as 'So you think you have mommy problems ... " said Sbordone. "It's the first time we're doing it here, it's made for CRT. It's a three person, one set show and to me, one of the finest dramas about faith and religion that you can find, it really is a brilliant show."

As the founder of Family Matters of Flagler, I am submitting a Request for a Cultural Arts Financial Assistance grant in the amount of \$3,000. Our organization understands that it is an 80% contribution and our total event will cost \$4,350.

Family Matters of Flagler has been in existence since 1998 and we founded several initiatives in our community, with many of them still in operation today. And we are proud to say that in 1999, we assisted the City of Palm Coast when it was first created by helping them establish their first parks and recreation programming by working in partnership to obtain a five year federal juvenile justice delinquency grant for \$100,000 a year for five years. This award funded the creation and operation of the Flagler Youth Center.

Family Matters of Flagler is known as a very active advocacy organization and we have been advocating for a dedicated senior center for Palm Coast for the past four years. We are known for our ability to create programs that meet our community's unmet needs and we design the programs with sustainability in mind from the beginning.

Examples of the programs we started are Flagler County Youth Center, Focus on Flagler Youth Coalition, the Palm Coast Historical Society, The African American Cultural Society Third Eye program, and the Flagler Chapter of the Boys and Girls Club. All of these programs are thriving today. We also assisted three times with the start up and fund development of a Flagler County YMCA. However, they are unable to continue to support programming in Flagler County without the County or City's help.

Our current initiatives include a senior employment program where we train and place senior citizens at not for profits or government agencies to upgrade their skills so they can re-enter the workforce. We are also working very closely with our county and city leaders on establishing a dedicated senior center.

In addition, we have embarked on our own food journey by acquiring a licensed food truck that we bring to community events to raise funds and to deliver the message that Seniors Matter! We sponsor several senior groups and we are currently serving 300 seniors who want to socialize and gather together. Our goal is to provide services on a daily basis in our own facility that has the ability to serve food because our seniors still want to socialize and many are on fixed incomes, so going out to restaurants is a true luxury they can't afford. Twenty eight percent (28%) of our county's population is over 65 and we have the highest concentration of seniors 90 and above and many of them are still active in community events.

Our newest initiative is called Seniors on a Mission- where we bring seniors together to assist other organizations in their efforts, and we are willing to provide a cadre of senior workers whenever the City of Palm Coast requests a need for volunteers.

And our seniors are mobile. Our office is a rehabilitated former mobile pet diagnostic lab that we converted and have placed on the road as a mobile office. (We are awaiting a sponsor for it!)

One of the unmet needs we have faced recently is transportation. Several of our seniors are unable to drive so we ventured into the area of senior transportation and we take trips out of county at least twice a month to visit and partake in cultural events outside of our community.



Family Matters of Flagler Inc. is a small, volunteer run not for profit organization. We have a dedicated group of Board members and well over 53 volunteers who assist in our mission of serving the families of Flagler County.

Since we are a small agency, we have a small budget, under \$10,000 and we have no paid staff. We have several collaborative agreements with signed MOU's that offer our organization in-kind (free) full service office space, with telephone and electric bills being paid by Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and paid, part time staff in a job training program with AARP called Senior Corp of Employment (SCEP).

Our Board voted to develop an audit oversight committee that oversees the spending of the budget we have established and as a result, we have not conducted an audit. We do not have the financial resources to pay for a report. The committee, which comprises a member who was formerly a CPA can and will attest that we follow standard accounting principles and that we are in full compliance. Our books are available for review and we bank at Vy-Star Credit Union.

In the past, our organization had received numerous federal and state grants and when we had the funds we always had an audit completed and we were always in full compliance with our funders.

We truly hope that you understand the reason we do not have an audit and we hope that you will still consider us for funding. In the near future, when our financial capacity increases we will at that time obtain a full review of our procedures.

Their involvement in the community through intergenerational and cross-cultural experiences enriches and strengthens the community and while doing so benefits the seniors.

For the past dour years, our agency and several key volunteers have been doing research and touring several Senior Centers and Senior programs in Florida and other states. We have thoroughly discussed what was seen and have designed programs that will result in as many seniors and young people working together, to meet the unmet needs.

Our goal is to provide healthy and nutritious meals at a site that is located in the heart of Palm Coast. Currently, our Seniors are being transported to Flagler Beach on a daily basis and they spend more time on the Flagler County Transportation buses than they do at the meal site, which limits the time the seniors have for socialization, cultural arts events and recreation. In general, seniors spend a lot of time by themselves and this leads to depression and isolationism and eventually their life fades away. Our goal is to keep seniors active and engaged and to help serve those seniors who are less fortunate than themselves.

Aging isn't what it used to be, and neither are today's senior centers. With a focus on wellness, lifelong learning, and volunteerism, senior centers are modernizing to meet the needs of today's older adults. Our goal is to develop a senior center that meets national accreditation standards so that seniors can discover tools to stay healthy, involved, and independent

National accreditation focuses on how senior centers provide opportunities for Learning, Independence, Friendship, and Energy.

"From the youngest baby boomers turning 50 to nonagenarians, older adults today are looking for empowerment, and senior centers are evolving to support their needs," said Maureen O'Leary, Program Manager of NCOA's National Institute of Senior Centers (NISC). "Senior centers are the first place to turn for valuable programs, cultural and recreation activities, and access to benefits and social services."

Older adults are a dynamic generation, looking for the opportunity to share their diverse skills and talents. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Flagler Auditorium Governing Board, Inc. (Governing Board), component unit of Flagler County District School Board, as of and for the years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Governing Board's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As financial management of The Flagler Auditorium Governing Board, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as the "Governing Board"), we offer the readers of these basic financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the Governing Board's financial activities for the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2017. This discussion and analysis is designed to assist the reader in focusing on the significant financial issues and activities and to identify any significant changes in financial position. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the Governing Board's financial statements, which follow this information.

Financial Highlights

- The Governing Board's overall combined assets totaled \$812,228 at the close of the 2017 fiscal year, compared to \$711,307 at the close of the 2016 fiscal year and \$622,025 in 2015. Total assets exceeded liabilities by \$767,376 (combined net position) compared with \$698,128 and \$611,529 one and two years earlier, respectively.
- The Governing Board's combined net position increased by \$69,248 in 2017, compared to increases of \$86,599 in 2016 and \$47,079 in 2015. Amounts invested in net capital assets and not available for spending totaled \$3,500 at the end of 2017 and 2016. Net position temporarily restricted for expendable uses totaled \$22,000 at year end (compared to \$27,000 one year earlier), which consists of restricted community support donations. Unrestricted net position increased by \$74,248 in 2017, compared to \$83,099 in 2016 and \$584,529 in 2015, all of which represents unrestricted and internally designated amounts that may be used to meet the Governing Board's ongoing obligations for its program activities.
- Amounts in unrestricted net position include \$386,822, which is designated by the board for capital additions, and \$24,062 which is designated by the board for use of state designated art license plate funds. The Governing Board increased its discretionary designation of other restricted funds by \$5,000 through the release of restricted funds granted by the donor in June 2017. These amounts are internally designated to be used for capital matching purposes for State of Florida Cultural Facility Grants. This grant qualification requires facilities to match the request amount with non-state funds, part of which may be in cash-on-hand and part of which may be in qualifying expenditures. At present, the Auditorium is anticipating the award of a matching grant of \$500,000 to be expended on capital improvements in the fiscal year 2017-18.
- The Governing Board generated gross performance, advertising and concession related revenues totaling \$510,633 in 2017, which was approximately 10% below the \$567,553 generated in 2016, and approximately 5% below the \$540,512 generated in 2015. This decrease was adversely affected by two unanticipated performance cancellations that occurred in March and April. Direct production costs consisting of producers, artists, contractors, advertising and concessions expenses totaled \$527,613 compared to \$546,884 and \$483,572 one and two years earlier, respectively. These decreases were also the result of the unanticipated loss of these same two performances Other community support and fundraising activities produced net revenues of \$139,924, \$106,663 and \$225,045 during 2016, 2015, and 2014, respectively.
- The Auditorium receives substantial support from the community in the form of volunteer hours donated for services such as Board Committees, ushering, concession operation, and general administrative work. The Auditorium also receives donated services from the Flagler County School Board related to the staffing and use of the facility for community use of the facility. These costs of these services are not recorded in the financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Governing Board presents its financial statements for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, which include for comparative purposes the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, certain accounts of which have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation in the current-year financial statements. The Governing Board is a direct support organization and a component unit of the Flagler County District School Board (a governmental agency). It also possesses the necessary characteristics of a governmental organization since the potential for unilateral dissolution with the reversion of its net position to the School District exists pursuant to Section 1001.453(1)(a)(1), Florida Statutes. The Governing Board accounts for its transactions in accordance with the pronouncements issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). The Governing Board is considered a Business-Type Activity under the provisions of GASB 34 and 35.

The Governing Board's financial statements are comprised of two parts: 1) management's discussion and analysis, and 2) the basic financial statements, including notes to the financial statements.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to the basic financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Governing Board's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data, key financial and operational indicators used in the strategic plan, budget, and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The basic financial statements consist of entity-wide financial statements that provide both the short- and long-term financial information about the Governing Board's financial activities, which are operated like commercial enterprises. These statements report information about the Governing Board using full accrual accounting methods and economic resources focus as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. Information concerning all of the Governing Board's assets and liabilities, both financial and capital, and short-term and long-term are included. Likewise, all revenues and expenses received during the year, regardless of when cash is received or paid are reported.

The basic financial statements of the Governing Board include a statement of net position; a statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position; a statement of cash flows; and notes to the financial statements, which are described as follows:

- The statement of net position (formerly the balance sheet) presents the financial position of the Governing Board on a full accrual, historical cost basis. This statement provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end.
- The statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position presents the results of the business activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net position changed during the year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Governing Board's various cost centers and administrative activities.
- The statement of cash flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operating, capital and related financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipts and cash disbursement information, without consideration of the earnings event, when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets, when applicable.
- The notes to the financial statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Governing Board's significant accounting policies, account balances and activities, material risks, obligations, commitments, contingencies and subsequent events, if any.

Entity-Wide Financial Analysis

The Governing Board's entity-wide financial statements report its net position and how they have changed over the reporting period. Net position (the difference between assets and liabilities) may serve as a useful indicator of the Governing Board's financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position are a useful indicator of whether the Governing Board's financial health is improving or deteriorating, respectively. However, other non-financial factors such as changes in economic conditions, population growth, and new or changed governmental legislation must be considered to adequately assess its overall health.

The material portion of the Governing Board's net position (97%) reflects its investment in surplus cash funds and investments, the material portion of which is designated for capital expansion of the Flagler Auditorium. The Governing Board's assets do not include any physical real or personal property of the Flagler Auditorium, which is owned exclusively by the Flagler County District School Board.

Net position is the sum of assets (both financial and tangible) minus all current liabilities and short and long-term debt obligations. Net position is a valuable measure of creditworthiness and financial health since the calculation includes both financial obligations and the capacity to service those obligations. This year, the Governing Board's combined total assets exceeded liabilities (net position) by \$767,376, compared to \$698,128 at the end of 2016, and \$611,529 at the end of 2015.

Total assets increased over last year by \$69,248 to a total of \$767,376, or an increase of 9.9% over last year's \$698,128. Total assets consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents, which make up 36% of total assets, noncurrent investments which include certificates of deposit make up 60%, accounts receivable and other current assets which make up 3%, and capital assets which make up 1%.

The Governing Board's total liabilities consist of accounts payable and accrued liabilities for current period operating activities of \$42,052 at the end of 2017, compared to \$3,454 and \$719 at the end of 2016 and 2015, respectively. Unearned ticket and advertising revenues received in advance totaled \$2,800 at the end of 2017, compared to \$9,725 and \$9,777 at the end of 2016 and 2015, respectively.

The portion of net position invested in capital assets remained unchanged at \$3,500 at the end of 2017 and 2016. This represents architectural and design costs borne by the Governing Board associated with the future expansion of the Auditorium, which is anticipated to occur in the next fiscal year. When the improvements are completed and placed in service, the final costs of the capital additions will be recognized as a contribution/donation to the Flagler County District School Board.

Amounts temporarily restricted for donor designated uses were reduced by \$5,000 in 2017 and totaled \$22,000, compared to \$27,000 at the end of 2016 and 2015. This reduction was authorized by the grantor to be used exclusively to finance costs associated with the expansion of the auditorium facilities. Unrestricted net position increased by \$74,248 and totaled \$741,876 at the end of 2017, compared to \$667,628 and \$584,529 at the end of 2016 and 2015, respectively.

While the statement of net position shows a snapshot of the Governing Board's financial position at the end of the fiscal year, the statement of activities provides answers as to the nature and sources of those changes that occurred during the year. During fiscal 2017, the Governing Board's operating revenues decreased by \$36,404, or 5.4%, compared to increases of \$42,740 (to a total of \$671,054) and \$27,925 (to a total of \$628,314) in 2016 and 2015, respectively. This year's decrease in performance revenues was primarily due to two unanticipated performance cancellations which ultimately negatively impacted this year's final performance ticket sales and concessions revenues.

During fiscal 2017, approximately 80.5% of the Governing Board's operating revenue was derived from performance tickets, showbills, concessions and auditorium rentals (\$510,633), compared to approximately 84.5% of the \$567,553 earned in 2016, and the 86.0% of the \$540,512 earned in 2015. At the same time, the Governing Board's combined revenues from local community patronage and support, state and local grants, and fundraising events totaled \$166,173 in 2017, compared to \$131,501 in 2016 and \$237,802 in 2015.

The Governing Board's spending on entertainment productions, advertising and concessions decreased by \$19,271 in fiscal 2017 and totaled \$527,613, compared to \$546,884 and \$483,572 in 2016 and 2015, respectively. Total amounts paid for student scholarships and other awards totaled \$22,194 in 2017, compared to \$17,390 and \$15,312 for years ended 2016 and 2015, respectively.

The Governing Board's substantially expanded its fundraising activities in fiscal 2017. The primary fundraising activities included the annual Holiday Extravaganza, Patron Gala, Afternoon Tea, Masquerade 5K, 25th Anniversary Cruise, and Homeshow events, which together produced fundraising revenues totaling \$50,787 in fiscal 2017, compared to \$35,422 in 2016 and \$23,300 in 2015. During these periods, overall fundraising expenses increased by only \$1,411 in 2017 and totaled \$26,249, compared to costs of \$24,838 and \$12,757 in 2016 and 2015, respectively. The Board's general and administrative costs increased from \$23,093 in 2015 to \$29,388 in 2016 to \$34,915 in 2017, largely due to increased contributions to the School Board for certain staffing costs.

Overall, The Governing Board's net position increased by \$69,249 in 2017, compared to \$86,599 in 2016, and \$47,079 in 2015.

Cash Flows

Net cash generated from operating activities continues to remain strong and totaled \$53,944 for the 2017 fiscal year, compared to \$56,823 earned in 2016 and \$96,460 in 2015. This represents a slight decrease of \$2,879 in cash flows from the Governing Board's total operating activities in 2016, which was the net result of an increase in net performance settlements received during the prior year.

Net cash from capital and related financing activities totaled \$45,156 in 2017, which is the net result of the receipt of funds from state and local grants, less amounts spent by the Governing Board on property and equipment which was subsequently transferred to the School District. Amounts actually received by the Governing Board from state and local grant receipts totaled \$45,156 in 2017, compared to \$10,000 one year earlier. The net book value of capital assets contributed to the District totaled \$3,009, \$3,500 and \$184,818 during 2017, 2016 and 2015, respectively.

Actual net cash received from investing activities included interest payments totaling \$5,756 in 2017, compared to \$2,840 and \$1,063 in 2016 and 2015, respectively.

Capital Assets

Capital Assets. During 2017, the Governing Board purchased capital assets totaling \$3,099 which were subsequently transferred to the Flagler County School District. The Governing Board's investment in capital assets, net of depreciation, for all activities is reflected in the following schedule.

Amounts capitalized in 2016 represent partial payments to a professional architect for preliminary design fees associated with anticipated future auditorium improvements. These costs, and all other capital costs incurred with the project, will be accumulated and conveyed to the Flagler County School District when the project is completed and the improved assets are placed in service.

Economic Factors That Will Affect The Future

Attendance of the Governing Board productions and charitable contributions is affected by various economic factors, such as the general state of the economy, the health of the stock market, surrounding competition and prospective donors' perception of the benefiting organization. The Governing Board has enjoyed a very positive reputation in the communities it serves and continues to see steady growth in charitable giving as well as maintaining strong attendance.

Some of the major factors considered by the Governing Board in the process of predicting future economic factors are the local economy, civilian labor force, unemployment rates, and inflation rates.

- The most recent estimates available for unemployment data in Flagler County, Florida are compiled by the Florida Agency for Workforce Innovation on the Florida Research and Economic Information Database Application (FREIDA). This agency estimates a 3.2% increase in the countywide Civilian Labor Force of 46,097 at the end of June 2017, compared with 44,673 at the end of June 2016. The number of unemployed workers dropped from 2,428 (or 5.4%) at the end of June 2016, to 2,196 (or 4.8%) at the end of June 2017.
- Inflationary trends for Flagler County compare favorably with those trends experienced at the state and national levels.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity – The Flagler Auditorium Governing Board, Inc. (the "Governing Board") is a direct support organization (as defined in Section 1001.453, Florida Statutes), and is considered a component unit of the Flagler County District School Board (the "School District") for financial reporting purposes. The Governing Board was formed as an I.R.C. Section 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation on July 26, 1991, whose objective is to promote the performing arts and community use of the Flagler Auditorium in Flagler County, Florida. It also possesses the necessary characteristics of a governmental organization since the potential for unilateral dissolution with the reversion of its net assets to the School District exists pursuant to Section 1001.453(1)(a)(1), Florida Statutes.

Basis of Presentation – As a component unit of the School District, the financial statements of the Governing Board have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (the "GASB") is the standard setting body for governmental accounting and financial reporting. The Governing Board has followed the financial presentation model of GASB Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments.

Basis of Accounting and Financial Reporting – For financial reporting purposes, the Governing Board is considered a special-purpose government entity engaged exclusively in business-type activities. Accordingly, the Governing Board's financial statements have been presented using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis, revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from non-exchange activities are generally recognized when all applicable eligibility requirements, including time requirements, are met.

Financial Statement Classification – The basic financial statements required for proprietary funds by GASB 34 are: a statement of net position or a balance sheet; a statement of activities; and a statement of cash flows. The statement of net position is presented in a classified format to distinguish between current and noncurrent assets and liabilities. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available to fund certain programs, it is the Governing Board's policy to first apply the restricted resources to such programs followed by the use of the unrestricted resources.

Fund Accounting – To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Governing Board, the accounts of the Governing Board are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose. All of the Governing Board's financial activity is accounted for in a single business-type fund, which contains restricted and unrestricted components. The Governing Board's Operating Account includes unrestricted and restricted resources, representing the portion of expendable and nonexpendable funds that are available for support of operations and funds available for use in accordance with specific restrictions, respectively.

Classification of Revenues - The Governing Board's principal operating activity is in performing arts programs, education program support programs and student scholarships. Operating revenues include the primary activities of presenting performances, conducting fundraising events, soliciting and accepting

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donor contributions and other program revenues. Non-operating revenues include investment income and earnings and contributions restricted for capital additions or endowments, when applicable. Operating expenses include all fiscal transactions related to performing arts, Governing Board management, and fundraising.

Donor Restricted Accounts – Restricted net position is cash that has been received through fundraising events, community support and grant funds that are designated for specific program funding and scholarships. Investment income, including unrealized appreciation and depreciation, is allocated to restricted accounts on a pro rata basis based on the nonexpendable account balance, when applicable. In accordance with state law, these funds are then available for expenditure when the specific restrictive donor criteria are met.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents represent both restricted and unrestricted cash in checking and money market accounts and include all highly liquid investments with initial maturities of three months or less. Cash deposits of the Governing Board are insured by Federal depository insurance to the extent of regulatory requirements.

Investments - Investments include certificates of deposit with initial maturities of greater than three months. Investment income consists of interest income earned.

Accounts and Pledges Receivable - The Governing Board's accounts receivable mainly consists of amounts receivable for showbill advertising, sponsorships and grant reimbursements and are reported on the balance sheet net of estimated uncollectible amounts. The Governing Board records an allowance for estimated uncollectible accounts in an amount approximating anticipated losses.

Inventories: Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market determined by the first-in, first-out method.

Capital Assets – The Governing Board's operations are maintained at facilities owned and operated by the School District at no cost to the Governing Board. When applicable, capital asset acquisitions intended for direct contribution to the School District are recorded as expenditures in the Governing Board's accounting records. Similarly, the costs of ongoing construction and/or rehabilitation projects related to capital assets of the School District are accumulated until completion of construction, at which time the aggregate costs are recognized as a direct contribution to the School District in the Governing Board's accounting records.

Capital asset acquisitions are recorded at cost, if purchased. Assets are capitalized having a useful life of greater than one year and with an original cost of \$500 or greater. Depreciation is provided using the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets, which is generally five years. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

During the year ended June 30, 2017, the Governing Board made asset acquisitions totaling \$3,009 which were subsequently contributed to the School District.

Net Position – The Governing Board's net position is classified as follows:

- Restricted Net Position Expendable includes resources the Governing Board is legally or contractually obligated to spend in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.
- Restricted Net Position Nonexpendable consists of endowment and similar type funds in
 which donors or outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the
 principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of
 producing present and future income.
- Unrestricted represents net position that is not restricted for any purpose and available for current operations.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments - The Governing Board did not hold any derivative instruments for trading purposes at June 30, 2017 and 2016, and does not invest in derivative instruments. The carrying amount of cash, receivables and payables approximates fair value.

Donated Property – Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations used to further the purposes of the Governing Board are recorded at estimated fair value at the time of donation, when applicable.

In-kind Contributions - In-kind contributions represent the fair market values for goods and services provided for the Governing Board. Contributions of services are recognized only if services received (a) create or enhance non-financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing these skills, and would typically be purchased if not provided by donations. These contributions are included in the Statement of Activities under the caption labeled "in-kind contributions", when applicable.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates used in preparing these financial statements include the allocation of salary costs to different program services and support services.

Revenue Recognition – An exchange or exchange-like transaction is one in which each party receives and sacrifices something of approximate equal value. Amounts received from exchange transactions (i.e., performance ticket fees, charges for advertising, etc.) are recognized as revenue when the exchange transaction takes place.

A non-exchange transaction is one in which one party receives something of value without directly giving value in exchange. Non-exchange transactions may include, but are not limited to:

Gifts/donations - Assets are recognized when all eligibility requirements are met or funds are
received; whichever is first. Revenue is recognized when all eligibility requirements have been
met. If gift is received prior to meeting eligibility requirements, it is recorded as deferred revenue.

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Eligibility requirements are conditions specified by a donor that must be met, such as time requirements, matching requirements. Purpose restrictions are not eligibility requirements and do not affect revenue recognition. Gifts received with purpose restrictions are reported as restricted until used for designated purpose or until restriction expires.

Some gifts are received with the stipulation that the resources cannot be sold, disbursed, or consumed until a specified number of years have passed or a specific event has occurred, such as endowments, term endowments, works of art and historical treasures. For these gifts, revenues are recognized when the resources are received, provided that all eligibility requirements are met. Resulting net assets are reported as restricted for as long as the restrictions or time requirements remain in effect.

- Certain grants, entitlements Assets are recognized when all eligibility requirements are met or funds are received; whichever is first. Revenue is recognized when all eligibility requirements have been met. If grant funds are received prior to meeting eligibility requirements, they are recorded as deferred revenue. Eligibility requirements are conditions specified by the grantor that must be met, such as an eligible recipient, time requirements, matching requirements, etc. Purpose restrictions are not eligibility requirements and do not affect revenue recognition. Grants received with purpose restrictions are reported as restricted.
- Promises to give (pledges) Amounts must be promised by a non-governmental entity –
 individual, business, or organization. Asset (receivable) and revenue are recognized when all
 eligibility requirements are met and amount is verifiable, measurable, and collection is probable
 (likely to occur). Endowment pledges are generally not recognized until received since the
 promise to not sell, disburse, or consume the asset cannot be honored until the asset has been
 received.

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted or restricted support, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Contributions received with donor-imposed restrictions that are met in the same year in which the contributions are received are classified as unrestricted contributions.

Investment earnings with donor restrictions are recorded in restricted net position based on the nature of the restrictions.

Employee Salaries and Benefits – Generally, all administration and management functions of the Governing Board are performed by individuals whose salaries, wages and related employee benefits are paid by the School District. During the year ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, the Governing Board agreed to reimburse the School District for a portion of the salaries, wages and related employee benefits paid by the School District in the amounts of \$56,434 and \$53,076, respectively.

The Governing Board does not recognize any pro-rata portion of liabilities for employment related benefits (i.e., employee insurance premiums, pension obligations, and other post-employment benefit obligations) of the School District.

Income Taxes - The Governing Board is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In addition, the Governing Board has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service not to be a "private foundation" within the meaning of

Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code; Accordingly, no provision for Federal and state income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

The Governing Board has adopted the standard for accounting for uncertain tax positions. The standard prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement principles for the financial statement recognition and measurement of tax positions taken or expected to be taken on a tax return that are not certain to be realized.

The Governing Board's tax returns (Form 990 and attachments) are subject to review and examination by the Federal and State authorities. The Governing Board is not aware of any activities that would jeopardize its tax-exempt status. The Governing Board is not aware of any activities that are subject to tax on unrelated business income or excise taxes. The tax returns for the fiscal years ending 2014 to 2017 are open to examination by Federal and state authorities.

Reclassifications – Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

New Accounting Standards – The following Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements have been implemented in the current financial statements:

- Statement No. 73, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pension and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement No. 68, and Amendments to Certain Provision of GASB Statements No. 67 and No. 68." Statement No. 73 establishes accounting and financial reporting requirements to defined benefit pension plans not subject to GASB Statement No. 68 "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions." There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 74, "Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans." The objective of this Statement is to improve the usefulness of information about postemployment benefits other than pensions (OPEB) included in the general purpose external financial reports of state and local governmental OPEB plans for making decisions and assessing accountability. This Statement results from a comprehensive review of the effectiveness of existing standards of accounting and financial reporting for all post-employment benefits (pensions and OPEB) with regard to providing decision-useful information, supporting assessments of accountability and interperiod equity, and creating additional transparency. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 75, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pension Plans." The primary objective of this Statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting by state and local governments for postemployment benefits other than pensions (OPEB). It also improves information provided by state and local governmental employers about financial support for OPEB that is provided by other entities. This Statement results from a comprehensive review of the effectiveness of existing standards of accounting and financial reporting for all post-employment benefits (pensions and OPEB) with regard to providing decision-useful information, supporting assessments of accountability and inter-period equity, and creating additional transparency. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.

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- Statement No. 76, "The Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles for State and Local Governments." The objective of this Statement is to identify in the context of the current governmental financial reporting environment the hierarchy of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The "GAAP hierarchy" consists of the sources of accounting principles used to prepare financial statements of state and local governmental entities in conformity with GAAP and the framework for selecting those principles. This Statement reduces the GAAP hierarchy to two categories of authoritative GAAP and addresses the use of authoritative and nonauthoritative literature in the event that the accounting treatment for a transaction or other event is not specified within a source of authoritative GAAP. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 77, "Tax Abatement Disclosures." Financial statements prepared by state and local governments in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles provide citizens and taxpayers, legislative and oversight bodies, municipal bond analysts, and others with information they need to evaluate the financial health of governments, make decisions, and assess accountability. This information is intended, among other things, to assist these users of financial statements in assessing (1) whether a government's current-year revenues were sufficient to pay for current-year services (known as inter-period equity), (2) whether a government complied with finance-related legal and contractual obligations, (3) where a government's financial resources come from and how it uses them, and (4) a government's financial position and economic condition and how they have changed over time. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 78, "Pensions Provided through Certain Multiple-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plans." The objective of this Statement is to address a practice issue regarding the scope and applicability of Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions. This issue is associated with pensions provided through certain multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans and to state or local governmental employers whose employees are provided with such pensions. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 79, "Certain External Investment Pools and Pool Participants." This Statement addresses accounting and financial reporting for certain external investment pools and pool participants. Specifically, it establishes criteria for an external investment pool to qualify for making the election to measure all of its investments at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes. An external investment pool qualifies for that reporting if it meets all of the applicable criteria established in this Statement. The specific criteria address (1) how the external investment pool transacts with participants; (2) requirements for portfolio maturity, quality, diversification, and liquidity; and (3) calculation and requirements of a shadow price. Significant noncompliance prevents the external investment pool from measuring all of its investments at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes. Professional judgment is required to determine if instances of noncompliance with the criteria established by this Statement during the reporting period, individually or in the aggregate, were significant. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.
- Statement No. 80, "Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 14." The objective of this Statement is to improve financial reporting by

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clarifying the financial statement presentation requirements for certain component units. This Statement amends the blending requirements established in paragraph 53 of Statement No. 14, The Financial Reporting Entity, as amended. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.

- Statement No. 81, "Irrevocable Split-Interest Agreements." The objective of this Statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting for irrevocable split-interest agreements by providing recognition and measurement guidance for situations in which a government is a beneficiary of the agreement. The Governing Board is not a party to any such agreements. The implementation of this statement did not materially change the financial statement presentation.
- Statement 82, "Pension Issues An Amendment of GASB Statements No. 67, No. 68 and No. 73." The objective of this Statement is to address certain issues that have been raised with respect to GASB. 67, Financial Reporting for Pension Plans, GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, and GASB 73, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That are Not within the Scope of GASB 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68. Specifically, this Statement addresses issues regarding (1) the presentation of payroll-related measures in required supplementary information, (2) the selection of assumptions and the treatment of deviations from guidance in an actuarial Standard Practice for Financial reporting purposes, and (3) the classification of payments made by employers to satisfy employee (plan member) contribution requirements. There was no impact to the Governing Board's financial statements as a result of this guidance.

The Governing Board is currently evaluating the effects that the following Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements, which will be implemented in future financial statements, will have on its financial statements for subsequent fiscal years.

- Statement 83,"Certain Asset Retirement Obligations." The objective of this statement is to address accounting and financial reporting for certain asset retirement obligations (AROs). An ARO is a legally enforceable liability associated with the retirement of a tangible capital asset. This statement is currently under review to evaluate the impact it may have on the Governing Board's financial statement presentation. The provisions of this statement are effective for fiscal years beginning June 15, 2018.
- Statement 84," Fiduciary Activities." The objective of this statement is to improve guidance regarding the identification of fiduciary activities for accounting and financial reporting purposes and how those activities should be reported. This statement is currently under review to evaluate the impact it may have on the Governing Board's financial statement presentation. The provisions of this statement are effective for fiscal years beginning December 15, 2018.

NOTE 2 - CASH DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

Cash Deposits - At June 30, 2017, the carrying amount of the Governing Board's cash deposits was \$295,761, and the bank balances were \$302,263, including brokerage money market accounts of \$3,493, all of which was covered by federal depository insurance. Included in the carrying amount of the governing Board's cash deposits is \$300 of petty cash.

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THE FLAGLER AUDITORIUM GOVERNING BOARD, INC.

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At June 30, 2016, the carrying amount of the Governing Board's cash deposits was \$240,620, and the bank balances were \$244,839, including brokerage money market accounts of \$2,461, all of which was covered by federal depository insurance. Included in the carrying amount of the governing Board's cash deposits is \$300 of petty cash.

Investments - Long-term investments are stated at fair value. All current period investments are limited to certificates of deposit which are valued at historical cost, including accrued interest. At June 30, 2017, the fair value of the Governing Board's investments in certificates of deposit totaled \$488,699, all of which was covered by federal depository insurance.

At June 30, 2016, the fair value of the Governing Board's investments in certificates of deposit totaled \$441,327, all of which was covered by federal depository insurance.

The Governing Board's investments were limited exclusively to certificates of deposit, all of which are included in the summary of deposits above. The investment maturities of the Governing Board's investment portfolio range from 1 month to 42 months, as follows:

Restrictions. Certain cash deposits are classified as restricted assets because their use is restricted by applicable donor covenants.

Interest Rate Risk. Interest rate risk exists when there is a possibility that changes in interest rates could adversely affect an investment's fair value. The Governing Board has developed formal investment policies that limit investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. All investments are governed by the Governing Board's Investment Policies and related state statutes. Generally, the Governing Board limits the acquisition of investments with maturities of greater than forty-eight months, unless such investments are purchased for holding to maturity. Interest rate risk is minimized for all other investments, which are normally held for periods of less than one year. At June 30, 2017, the Governing Board had \$488,699 invested in bank certificates of deposit with an average yield of 1.50% and average maturities of 15.3 months.

Credit Risk. State Statutes authorize the Governing Board to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury and federal agency securities, along with certain pre-refunded public obligations, such as bonds or other obligations of any state of the United States of America or of any agency, instrumentality, or local governmental unit of any such state. The Governing Board's investment policy specifically provides that

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sufficient cash, as determined by the Treasurer and Finance Committee, will be maintained in bank or money market accounts that are fully insured. Other financial investments shall be made for periods up to 5 years, provided that there is an opportunity to withdraw funds in an emergency, and will only be made in instruments that are fully FDIC insured, or equivalent protection.

Custodial Credit Risk. Custodial credit risk is the risk that an entity will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party if the counterparty fails. At June 30, 2017, the Governing Board's had investments in certificates of deposit totaling \$488,699 are uncollateralized, but are covered by federal deposit insurance.

Foreign Currency Risk. The Governing Board is not exposed to any foreign currency risk at September 30, 2017.

NOTE 6 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Governing Board is a legally established direct-support organization and component unit of the Flagler County District School Board, whose objective is to promote the performing arts and community use of The Flagler Auditorium in Flagler County, Florida. To meet this objective, the Governing Board is permitted to use the Flagler Auditorium, certain other property, facilities, and personal services of the District, provided the rules of the School Board are followed. As a result, various administrative and internal service functions are provided to the Governing Board throughout the year by the District without remuneration. The Governing Board has elected to not include the value of these donated materials and services, which are significant to the operations of the Governing Board, in the accompanying financial statements.

Throughout the year, the School District utilizes the Flagler Auditorium for school related functions and activities. In conjunction with those activities, the Governing Board collects school-related admission fees and rentals and makes payments for activity related expenses on behalf of the School District. Amounts collected by the Governing Board on behalf of the School District in the form of auditorium admission fees, rentals and concessions during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, totaled \$96,863 and \$104,268, respectively. Reimbursements collected by the Governing Board for the payment of performance related expenses and other expense reimbursements totaled \$38,051 and \$36,557, respectively, for the years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016. The resultant amount of settlements paid to the School District by the Governing Board during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, totaled \$58,812 and \$68,237, respectively.

During the years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, the Governing Board reimbursed the School District for a portion of the salaries and related employee benefits for the Executive Director and Public Relations and Marketing representative in the amount of \$56,434 and \$53,076, respectively.

NOTE 7 – COMMITMENTS

The Governing Board is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; natural causes for which the Governing Board carries commercial insurance. The Governing Board has incurred no losses in excess of coverage in the last three years.

NOTE 8 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Performance Productions and Contracts. Subsequent to year end, the Governing Board anticipates entering into formal contract commitments with various agents and performers totaling approximately \$350,000 for productions that will occur in the next fiscal year.

Grants and Capital Renovations. The Governing Board has been awarded a State of Florida Cultural Facility Grant of approximately \$500,000 for the purpose of financing various capital improvements to the Flagler Auditorium. This grant for facilities improvements requires the grantee to match the grant request amount with non-state funds, part of which may be in cash-on-hand and part of which may be in qualifying expenditures. The Governing Board anticipates using its current restricted and its designated unrestricted funds in the aggregate amount of up to \$500,000 as the required local match for this project in the next fiscal year.

Events and Transactions. In preparing these financial statements, the Governing Board has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through September 7, 2017, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.





The FPC Arts Hall of Fame

This year, the art league is using a commemorative logo, which was designed by an FPC student, who submitted the design as part of a community-wide contest to design the anniversary logo.


Congratulations to Adam Young whose design is being used on all FCAL materials in 2018!



More Undercover Adventures with Robert Wittman

Exiting as Editor







Women Who Read Are Dangerous - Stefan Bollman

What is it about a woman reading that has captivated hundreds of artists over the centuries? Stefan Bollmann's *Women Who Read Are Dangerous* explores this popular subject in more than 70 artworks—drawings, paintings, photographs, and prints—by iconic artists such as Henri Matisse, Edward Hopper, Suzanne Valadon, August Sander, Rembrandt, and many more. As the book's provocative title indicates, a woman reading was once viewed as



radical. In chapters such as "Intimate Moments" and "The Search for Oneself," Bollmann profiles how a woman with a book was once seen as idle or suspect and how women have gained autonomy through reading over the years. Bollmann offers intelligent and engaging commentary on each work of art in *Women Who Read Are Dangerous*, telling us who the subject is, her relationship to the artist, and even what she is reading. With works ranging from a 1333 Annunciation painting of the angel Gabriel speaking to the Virgin Mary, book in hand, to twentieth-century works, such as a stunning photograph of Marilyn Monroe reading Ulysses, this appealing survey provides a veritable slideshow of the many iterations of a woman and her book—a compelling subject to this day.





The Flagler Performing Arts Academy (a 5013c nonprofit) greatly appreciates the opportunity to apply for grant assistance from the City of Palm Coast. Our program received funding from your organization last summer and as a result we were not only able to provide 40 children with a 3 week professional quality musical theater training, but over 400 community residents were able to enjoy the magic of a high quality theatrical experience.

3. THE VALUE OF CAMP TO THE CITY OF PALM COAST 'S RESIDENTS AND VISITORS:

Multiple studies show that both making of theatre, and attending live theatre, contribute to educational and social development, yet often these are the first programs that are cut from many schools.

Research shows that students involved in drama performance outscore non-arts students on the SAT by an average of 65 points in the verbal component and 34 points in the math. Drama students also demonstrate improved school attendance and have lower dropout rates. Performing arts programs have proven to be particularly beneficial to students with learning difficulties.

Drama teaches children to listen, observe and empathize with those around them. Drama students learn to cooperate and collaborate with the other participants through the rehearsal and performance process. Musical theatre fosters a social awareness through exposure to the social issues, events and cultures portrayed in the scripts. Performing on stage requires tremendous concentration and sustained mental focus which is a skill that carries over to all aspects of life.

Furthermore **watching** live theatre also has numerous benefits. According to a 2014 study at Arkansas, watching live theatre enhances literary knowledge, tolerance and empathy of students to a far greater degree than reading or watching a movie can produce. The inclusion of human conflict in many plays increased individuals ability to comprehend and empathize with other people's feelings and reactions, and helps people relate to each other.

Theatre not only entertains and enchants the audience, it fires the imagination, giving children the skills, curiosity and creativity they need to understand the complex world we live in, and music in a live show sparks something in children that is difficult to extinguish.

Finally, having live theatre events, especially those that cater to families and children of all ages, promotes our community. Programs like ours is what attracts visitors and potential home buyers. By exposing the community to the Arts, we strive to attract audience members of all ages, cultural backgrounds, and experiences.

3. HOW THE CITY OF PALM COAST'S FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE WILL BE USED AND WHY FUNDING FROM THE CITY IS ESSENTIAL FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE PROGRAM.

The financial assistance from the City will be used for **Royalties**, (which includes: rights, scripts, and musically arrangements) and **Supplies** (which includes: props, sets, and costumes and as required at least 20% of grant money will be used for **advertising**.

Funds from the City are essential for The Summer Musical Theatre Program to take place. The children in our community deserve the most thoughtful, careful, and developmentally appropriate instruction that we can provide. Yet, we need to keep camp fees and ticket prices reasonable so that those with limited funds might still participate. The only way we can accomplish this is through assistance such as the City offers. We will also be seek donations and volunteer help, do fundraising, and look for other grant opportunities.

Since 2005, the Gargiulo Art Foundation has gained considerable experience installing 14 outdoor public sculptures in the City of Palm Coast. Our grant for 2019, if approved, will be used to advertise the installation of a sculpture garden in Town Center. Our Foundation is committing **\$100,000** over a period of four years to this project.

Well known Deland Sculptor Harry Messersmith will head this project. The former Deland Museum of Art Director has considerable expertise working and directing community projects. His sculptures adorn many private and public collections throughout Deland including the brick façade of Deland City Hall. The Artist is familiar with Palm Coast and has met with Ken Jones, Arts' Commission Chairman and Beautification Committee Member on the Town Center Lake site.

Excitement is building among area sculptors for the **proposed Sculpture Garden in Palm Coast**. Artist Harry Messersmith and the Gargiulo Art Foundation, aware of problems associated with public outdoor sculptures in other cities have a new approach for sculptors' concerns. Palm Coast financial assistance was granted to install the loan of an interactive sculpture **IMAG NE**), at **the Flagler County Public Library** and **Town Center in Palm Coast** for two months. The sculpture was well received at both sites. An opportunity was missed to purchase the sculpture from the artist at a greatly discounted price to the GAF for lack of funds. The sculpture went on to Georgia for a two month loan and was purchased by a town in Georgia.

We were recently contacted by Palm Coast officials to consider a Key West Sculptor's work. So it is obvious to us that the City is aware of the value of Art in Public Places in Palm Coast. Full financial support, if awarded, will be used for advertising the program.

The GAF will purchase the loaned pieces in four years or less and gift them to the City. This will provide sculptors the opportunity to show their costly art at less expense. GAF will match contributions 50 – 50 for purchases of sculpture. A plaque will accompany all donated work with contributor names listed. This will give patrons and businesses incentive to match the Foundation's contribution. For example . . . a sculpture costing \$16,000 (Paul Baliker's Florida Panther at Linear Park) would be \$4,000 a year for four years. The Foundation would pay \$2,000 each year and the sponsor(s) will contribute 50%. A plaque will be installed listing contributors in year five.

Harry Messersmith's 3 outdoor bronze relief sculptures at the Publix Shopping center, Palm Coast Parkway between Firehouse Subs and Pizza Hut is the result of a collaboration of GAF, the artist, Palm Coast Landscape Architect Bill Butler, and property owner can promote art and culture in Palm Coast.

My dream is to recognize Palm Coast, not only for its beautiful palm trees, but as a destination for visitors and tourists to view our city's arts and culture.

We hope LSAB will support our project and award GAF the maximum financial assistance.

(1) Purpose of Palm Coast Arts Foundation

The Palm Coast Arts Foundation established in 2004 as a public, non-profit organization focuses on bringing quality entertainment and cultural arts to our community. The Foundation has continued to build on a unified vision – to design and build a Center for the Arts that will establish the Palm Coast/Flagler beaches area as a world-class forum for the arts. Our mission is to nurture and spotlight the arts and economy by providing vision, venues, and facilitation.

A 15+-acre cultural arts complex is being developed here in Town Center. The Palm Coast Arts Foundation (PCAF) has put in place a strategy in which to phase funding and construction of the project. Phase I commenced February 2016 with a ground-breaking ceremony and in December that same year, we had the official ribbon cutting of our new outdoor stage. Phase II of this project is a Raise the Roof campaign to provide necessary funds to construct a permanent span-system roof structure over the stage. Phase III will be a 20,000+ sq/ft events center with a catering kitchen; and Phase IV will be a 2,200 performing arts center with the capability of all types of performances from Broadway to Opera, music of all genres, dance, theatre, etc.; all over time as funding is secured.

(2) Program description

Our annual Shakespeare in the Park is a sophisticated theatre performance performed on the large outdoor stage of the Palm Coast Arts Foundation under our custom BIG TOP tent in Town Center at 1500 Central Avenue. TAMING OF THE SHREW is the play chosen for this second performance. It is our hope to offer the community a different Shakespeare performance each year. Dates of the performances will be: February 21-24, 2019 allowing flexibility in the schedule for our guests

The importance of the program is an introduction to arguably the world's most famous playwright, William Shakespeare whose works have been performed in England since their debut in the 16th and 17th centuries. The earliest known staging of Shakespeare here in the U.S. (then the colonies) was 1750 and theatre companies have produced performances ever since.

We hope to attract a minimum of 150 guests per performance for a total of 600. Last year's MACBETH performances sold out each night.

(3) How Proceeds will be utilized:

Our goal is to improve the quality of life for residents and visitors alike by providing access to high quality and challenging performing and visual arts events. By igniting the mind, the arts have taught us new ways of thinking, communicating, and doing business.

Grant funds will go directly toward performance expenses (sound, lighting, rentals, actors, costumes, marketing). External funding is imperative in order to keep ticket costs to a minimum.



This impact has proved and recorded achievement of outcomes within the greater communities state-wide, that participants rated 100% outstanding achievement success.

The further impact on the community of Stockton is to involve a multi-cultural level of awareness within all age ranges, school levels, and beyond cultures, ethnic race, religions and beliefs within the means of helping to build civic community relations through the arts.

The Value

The value has been for all participants to share in a unique cultural experience and learn hands on, in the interaction of a historical -African tradition within the arts of dance and drumming collective, as well as, promote strong community values, collaboration, and higher learning developmental skills. The value of providing a multi-level skill that addresses cognitive thinking, as well as physiological and physical applications for fine & large motor muscle groups extends into a vital community learning success. Drumming and dance have given many young children and youth a rare art form that instantly creates greater community function, inhibits thinking skills of basic educational properties, and provides folkloric historical traditions that have been passed down and preserved from traditional elders in the community, as an oral tradition.

The value of this art form is highly prized as an educational art form widely practiced in its home region of Africa, but at the same time stands the chance of being lost in its dissemination into the Americas, as well as suffering the endangerment as an art form that has faced and witnessed the lesser Metropolitan cultural value- from its folkloric identification within the rural and metropolitan city areas.

Students will acquire the understanding of poly rhythms, a distinct tradition of West African Culture and village drumming styles, and how it created a social aptitude within secular and sacred communities. They will learn function and meaning as it is ingrained within the cultural context of the particular drum rhythms, dances and songs, as well, as understand the significance of restorative, rehabilitating and preventative teachings, applications and understanding that has been known in African societies. They will learn techniques of dance, drum and song that embrace universal meaning of elements, reciprocals, call/response, centering and grounding exercises that have to do with the matrix of life, rites of passage, agriculture cycles of planting, harvesting and cultivation. They will learn drum notation (as musical theory) and how it is applied to each drum and player in the ensemble, learning style and form of poly rhythmic phrasing within dance and music, as well as, greater appreciation for its historical context in building collaborative community.

Outcome: Students will be able to do the particular dance steps with the rhythmic music, and then apply the single dance steps to a whole body of movement in a complete dance.

Measurement will be through observation of student learning and video- taping, as well as, track and chart how many students will be able to retain dance movement.

Outcome: Students will be able to describe music and dance in their social meaning, content and geographical area of traditions.

Measurement will be through observation of student learning and video- taping, as well as, share, demonstrate and identify in the classroom with their other classmates.

Outcome: Students will be able to apply the basic drum techniques into a whole rhythmic phrasing, being able to play individual parts within the bass or tone of the poly rhythm, and be able to identify the rhythm by name, origin and ethnic culture.

Measurement will be through observation of student learning and video- taping, as well as, share, demonstrate and identify in the classroom with their other classmates, a particular drum rhythm individually and with the ensemble group.

The overall success will be measured by:

50% Participation 50% Performance Work

Once the students achieve this goal it will help affect the definition of the greater purpose of the project, as historically, culturally and socially effective.

I will assess how the students achieve this outcome by seeing how well the students can fully integrate the dance steps into the whole perspective of the dance within persistence, participation and greater appreciation of this art form and the traditional significance it serves on the individual, collaborative community, greater knowledge and determination for self within leadership qualities, as well as, skills that characterize the power to expand perceptual, intellectual, cultural and spiritual dimensions of human experience.

The slight benchmark for this age group would be at least 3/4 of the group to achieve the standard of artistic perception and historical-cultural content.

The greater excellence we wish to achieve will be to reach every participant in the program with further acknowledgment and recognition of African Arts, and to incite and create further inspiration, self-esteem, empowerment into the artwork, learning historical contributions and accomplishments of the African Diaspora within the cultural arts and traditions of Music, Dance, Instruments/Ceremonial, Community, as well as, increase public awareness & strengthen the arts within an unrecognized art form in the City of Palm Coast, FL & greater Flagler County, and finally to increase the audience diversity and create a recognition for the preservation, articulation and restoration of the artistic historical content.



We are sending this letter to explain the withholding requirements, and to give you the information you need to explain these requirements to nonresident payees.

What types of income are subject to withholding? Withholding is generally required on payments made to people who don't reside in California but are paid:

- For services performed as an independent contractor in California,



IMPORTANT NOTE: If the California resident, qualified corporation or partnership is acting as an agent for the nonresident payee, this exception does not apply.
- 3 The total payments of California source income to the independent contractor are less than \$1501 for the calendar year.
- 4. The payment is to an organization that is exempt from tax under California or federal law.
- 5. The payments are compensation from a motor carrier providing transportation in two or more states, subject to Section 11504(b) of the United States Code.
- 6. The payments are wages paid to employees (wage withholding is administered by the California Employment Development Department).
- 7. The payment is to a bank or banking association.
- 8. The payment is to a nonresident corporate director for director services, including attendance at board of directors' meetings.
- 9. The payee or payer has a written authorization from us (the California Franchise Tax Board) waiving withholding.


STOCKTON — Danielle Carpenter, 17, didn't like the way she looked. And so she didn't like herself.

Audit Committee Report - April 19, 2018

<u>Committee Members</u>: Thomas McKean instructed the committee; Sue Bennett Bara, Janet Correia, Kathryn Munro and Marinus Grootenboer reviewed the books and Susan McConnell was present to answer any questions.

The committee met on April 19, 2017 at Andy and Susan McConnell's home to review the Treasurers records for the 2017/2018 season.

The review included:

- 1. Reconciling Bank Statements with Treasurers Reports based on the check register balances.
- 2. Sampling deposit records and corresponding bank records.
- 3. Sampling expense disbursement records with check register and bank records
- 4. Reviewing record keeping processes and methodology

Results:

- 1. All monthly records since the last audit reconcile to bank statements based on a sampling.
- 2. Adequate deposit documentation was available and records matched. There were no issues finding documentation and records.
- 3. All expense disbursements were supported by invoices or other supporting documentation.
- 4. All record keeping was computerized and supporting hardcopy documentation was kept by month in two large binders.
- 5. An excel spreadsheet was available to review expenses and deposits of all transactions.
- 6. Record keeping processes and methodology were easy to follow using the excel spreadsheet and documentation in the ledger books.
- 7. Wells Fargo Bank account was closed on 9/5/2017 and the club only uses Intracoastal Bank.

Recommendations from the last audit made:

- 1. Follow up, or reissue, outstanding Wells Fargo check and close the Wells Fargo account.
 - Account closed in 9/2017
- 2. Complete reconciliation of restricted and non-restricted funds at close of season.

Tom McKean tracks the restricted funds. Two errors were noted in his reconciliation (double entries were noted on 2 items \$25.00 and \$689.71). This will be reviewed and followed up by Tom to determine if there is an error of double entry made or the transactions are correct. It was suggested that Andy add a column to the excel spreadsheet tracking restricted funds. It will be up to Andy if he wants to do it for 2017-2018 or start in 2018-2019 calendar year.

- 3. In order to address the documentation issue related to the initial source of deposited funds, issue a receipt for all income with a copy for the club records.

 This has been implemented for this current year
- 4. Record additional documentation for each transaction manually in the check register. Entered on the current excel spread sheet and in binders
- 5. The Chairperson for each major event (with expected revenue generation over \$3000) must submit a summary budget to the Board for approval prior to authorization of funds. The treasurer must keep a record of the budget approval document.
- 6. Each Chairperson is responsible for funds received or disbursed by their specific committee. The chairperson should provide adequate documentation to the treasurer. In addition, each chairperson should be required to maintain their own document file for this purpose. Correct documentation is being presented to the treasurers for adequate documentation.

Recommendation from 2018 Audit:




