The CIP was created consistent with current funding allocations. Included in the 10-year CIP, are utility, stormwarter, transportation, parks and recreational, public safety and general government capital projects.

### **Background**

The City completed Phase 1 of Holland Park in June 2017. During this past year the design of the Phase 2 improvements was finalized. In addition, City Council directed staff to add dedicated pickleball courts to at least one other City Park. The Parks Team evaluated City Parks and identified an area at Ralph Carter Park for the addition of pickleball courts. The design team (S&ME, Inc.) for Holland Park was hired to provide the design of the additional pickleball court design since it was already in their contract. The City has already contracted with BBI Construction Management (BBI) to provide construction management-at-risk services for both of these projects. During the preconstruction phase BBI assisted with finalizing the design & construction drawings and established a Guaranteed Maximum Price for construction associated with both the Holland Park Phase 2 Improvements as well as the addition of pickleball courts at Ralph Carter Park.

Holland Park, Phase 2 improvements include, but are not limited to:

- Playground Zones (Construction Zone, The Hammock)
- Splash Pad (The Spring and The Shore)
- Sports Lighting for Horseshoe, Volleyball, Tennis, Racquetball, Pickleball and Shuffleboard
- Bocce Ball Court Rehabilitation and New Covering
- Maintenance Building
- Renovation of Pavilion 3 Restrooms
- Picnic Pavilions

Note: The following items were in the original scope, but recommended for deletion due to budget constraints:

- Pickleball Courts (2)
- Racquetball Courts (3)
- Exercise Fitness Station Area

#### Ralph Carter Park:

Pickleball courts (6): The original design was for 3 courts. Per City Council direction, the
design was modified to provide maximum courts that could fit in area identified. The
design was modified to provide 6 courts.

This agenda item includes three (3) related items for City Council consideration to accomplish Holland Park, Phase 2 and Ralph Carter Park pickleball courts.

# **Construction Management-At Risk Contract Amendment**

BBI has completed its initial bidding and has developed a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) that was almost \$2.6 million over budget for Holland Park and more than \$350,000 over budget for Ralph Carter Park. SM&E, City staff, and BBI reviewed and modified the design, reviewed and

analyzed value engineering alternatives, and clarified bids to reduce the Holland Park GMP overage about 50% for consideration by City Council. Additional funding is available in the Capital Improvements Projects budget to cover the revised GMP amount.

This resolution authorizes the City Manager to execute a contract amendment with BBI to establish the GMP in the amount of (currently being finalized and will be provided at the workshop) as well as approving a 5% city contingency for construction in the amount of (currently being finalized and will be provided at the workshop). The existing construction management contract provides that BBI is AT-RISK to deliver this project within the GMP; so any cost overruns would be BBI's sole responsibility, not the City. Any cost savings would be shared by BBI and the City.

#### Work orders with S&ME, Inc.

The City contracted with S&ME, Inc. for the design of the playground and splash pad as well as pickle ball court design. This item includes two work orders with S&ME, in the amount of \$66,900.00, to provide Construction Phase Services for Holland Park Phase 2 Improvements as well as a Ralph Carter Park Pickle Ball Court Projects.

### Work order with JPA

The City contracted with Joseph Pozzuoli Architect (JPA) for the design of the existing building renovations and new building structures. This item also includes a Work Order with JPA, in the amount of \$33,985.50, for Construction Phase Services for Holland Park Phase 2 Improvements.

GMP will be discussed with City Council at the workshop and the source of funds worksheet will be provided prior to the business meeting.

#### **Recommended Action:**

Adopt Resolution 2019-XX approving a contract amendment with BBI and work orders with S&ME and JPA for phase II improvements to Holland Park and Ralph Carter Park phase services.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PALM COAST, FLORIDA, APPROVING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF A CONTRACT AMENDMENT WITH BBI TO ESTABLISH A GMP AND TWO WORK ORDERS FOR CONSTRUCTION PHASE SERVICES FOR HOLLAND PARK PHASE II WITH S&ME, INC. AND JPA; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER, OR DESIGNEE, TO EXECUTE THE CONTRACT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS, PROVIDING FOR IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS,** BBI desires to provide construction phase services for Holland Park phase II for the City of Palm Coast; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council of the City of Palm Coast desires to have BBI, perform the above referenced services.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF PALM COAST, FLORIDA:

# SECTION 1. APPROVAL OF CONTRACT AMENDMENT AND WORK

**ORDERS**. The City Council hereby approves the terms and conditions of amendment #1 to the contract with BBI, establishing the guaranteed maximum price, and two work orders with S&ME, Inc. and JPA, for construction phase services for Holland Park phase II and Ralph Carter Park, as referenced herein and attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

**SECTION 2. AUTHORIZATION TO EXECUTE.** The City Manager, or designee, is hereby authorized to execute the necessary documents.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Resolution are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Resolution shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this Resolution.

**SECTION 4. CONFLICTS.** All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict with any of the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 5. IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS.** The City Manager is hereby authorized to take any actions necessary to implement the action taken in this Resolution.

**SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage and adoption.

#### **Phase Four - Construction Contract Administration**

In this phase JPA will assist the General Contractor in providing administration of the construction contract as contained in the latest edition of The American Institute of Architects document. General Conditions – Articles 1 thru 14.

- Review of shop drawings and other submissions from the contractor.
- Appropriate interval visits to the site to determine in general if the work is preceding in conformance with the construction documents.
- Preparing Change Orders.
- Reviewing contractors Application for Payment and issuing Certificates of Payment.
- Determine Substantial and Final completion.

#### **Additional Services**

Upon Owners request, the following can be provided at an hourly rate – Unless Noted Otherwise:

Interior Design, DRC Approvals, Site Plan Approvals, City/County Commission Approvals, Civil Engineering, Landscaping, Irrigation, Rezoning, Comprehensive plan amendment, variances, special exceptions, etc. Permit Fees, construction contract administration, application fees, soil borings, surveying, testing services, special inspector services, shop drawing reviews, construction cost budgeting, Civil Engineering certifications, fire sprinkler drawings or calculations, parking layout, etc. storm water management system and drainage, drainage calculations and approvals from the DEP design, environmental assessments, concurrency reservation application, traffic engineering or studies, tree mitigation, bidding assistance, any taxes, fees, bonds, permitting services, design services and documentation required for LEED certification, design services commonly referred to "BIM", use of Revit, or other specialized software, multiple or alternate system designs other than as discussed herein "Record Drawings", as-built documentation, design updates necessary to accommodate building code revisions which would be unreasonable to except to be anticipated at the onset of design, and any services not specifically included in the scope of services.

**Joseph Pozzuoli Architect** will execute reasonable care and professional skill in preparation and execution of the documents according to this agreement, but does not guarantee perfect or flawless judgment.

A survey must be provided in paper format and/or electronic format which accurately identifies all above ground improvements within the project site.

Additional work not specifically outlined within the scope of services listed above is to be charged on an hourly rate based on the attached Exhibit "B". These rates will be in effect for at least one year from contract date. The monthly carrying charge will be at 1.55%. The above does not include any surveying fees, soil testing fees, permitting fees, out of pocket expenses, all of which will be billed at their respective cost.

JPA shall invoice the Client at the beginning of the month for all reimbursable expenses and work performed during the proceeding month. Invoices shall be paid within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice. In the event that an invoice is not paid in full within sixty (60) days, JPA reserves the right to stop all work and claim of lien as authorized by Florida's Construction Lien Law, and notify the Client. Client also agrees to pay any costs associated with collections of outstanding invoices including reasonable attorney's fees.

Additional consultants or additional services by consultants, photocopies, postage, express mail, courier services, out-of-town travel - @ \$0.55/mile, and other miscellaneous costs will be reimbursable at actual cost.

Payment requirements for services rendered are outlined in the attached Exhibit "C". Client will be billed for the work performed and expenses incurred based on Exhibit "A". Payment for any "Additional Services", work not specifically described in Exhibit "A", will be billed as the number of hours spent on the work and under the fee schedule of Exhibit "B". At your written request, we will provide you with an estimated fee for performing the additional services and make such work subject to all the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

JPA shall furnish (6) sets of final approved signed and sealed drawings as part of the lump sum price. Additional blueprints & plots will be invoiced with an additional charge of 1.5 times the cost of any printing company invoices paid by JPA. In house printing will be invoiced at \$3.50 dollars per sheet (24"x36"), \$5.10 per sheet (30 x 42"), and \$1.75 per sheet (11" x 17").

#### JOSEPH POZZUOLI ARCHITECT STANDARD PROVISIONS

#### 1. JPA Scope of Services

JPA's undertaking to perform professional services and prepared documents necessary to obtain approvals by the applicable permitting agencies for the services specifically described in this Agreement. However, if requested by the Client and agreed to by JPA, JPA will perform additional services ("Additional Services") hereunder. JPA is also authorized, but not required, to perform Additional Services for services deemed appropriate by JPA in response to emergencies, unanticipated actions by the Client contractors, revised regulations, or requirements of authorities, if advance authorization cannot be obtained. JPA will notify the Client as soon as practical of the inception of such Additional Services.

#### 2. Client's Responsibilities

In addition to other responsibilities described herein or imposed by law, the Client shall:

- a. Designate in writing a person to act as its representative with respect to this Agreement, such person having complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, and make or interpret the Client's decisions.
- Arrange for access to the site and other private or public property as required for JPA to provide its services
- c. Review all documents or oral reports presented by JPA and render in writing decisions pertaining thereto within a reasonable time so as not to delay the services of JPA.
- d. Furnish approvals and permits from governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the project and approvals and consents from other parties as may be necessary for completion of JPA's services.
- e. Cause to be provided such independent accounting, legal, insurance, cost estimating and overall feasibility services as the Client may require or JPA may reasonably request.
- f. Give prompt written notice to JPA whenever the Client becomes aware of any development that affects the scope and timing of JPA's services or any defect or noncompliance in any aspect of the project.
- g. Bear all costs incident to the responsibilities of the Client.

#### 3. Period of Services

Unless otherwise stated herein, JPA will begin work timely after receipt of an executed copy of this Agreement and will complete the services in a reasonable time. This agreement is made in anticipation of conditions permitting continuous and orderly progress through completion of services. Times for performance shall be extended as necessary for delays or suspensions due to any circumstances that JPA does not control. Such a delay or suspension shall not terminate this Agreement unless JPA elects to terminate pursuant to other provisions of this Agreement. If such delay or suspension extends for more than six months (cumulatively) for reasons beyond JPA's control, the various rates of compensation provided for this Agreement shall be renegotiated.

If the services covered by this agreement have not been completed within 24 months from the date that this contract was signed by both parties, through no fault of JPA or the design team, JPA compensation for the incomplete portion of the work shall be on a time and materials basis billed at the hourly rate of \$300.00 per hour.

#### 4. Compensation for Additional Services

Unless otherwise agreed to in writing, the Client shall pay JPA for the performance of any Additional Services as amount based-upon JPA's current hourly rates plus an amount to cover certain direct expenses including in –house duplicating and blueprints, local mileage, telephone calls, electronic messaging, postage, and word processing. Other direct expenses will be billed at 1.5 times cost.

#### 5. Method of Payment

Compensation shall be paid to JPA in accordance with the following provisions:

- a. Invoices will be submitted by JPA to the Client per Exhibit "A". Payment of each invoice will be due within 25 days of receipt. The Client shall also pay to JPA all taxes, if any, whether state, local, or federal, levied with respect to amounts paid hereunder. JPA shall be compensated in U.S. dollars. Interest will be added to accounts after 25 days at 1.5% per month. If the Client fails to make any payment due JPA for services and expenses within 30 days after JPA's transmittal of its invoice, JPA may, after giving 7 days written notice to the client, suspend services under this agreement until all amounts due are paid in full.
- b. If the Client objects to an invoice, it must advise JPA in writing giving its reasons within 14 days of receipt of the invoice or the Client's objections will be waived, and the invoice shall conclusively be deemed due and owing.
- c. If JPA initiates legal proceedings to collect payment, the prevailing party shall be entitled to payment by the other party of all reasonable cost, charges and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees relating to such action through all levels of proceedings, expended or incurred in connection therewith by the prevailing party.
- d. The Client agrees that the payment for services rendered and expenses incurred by JPA pursuant to this Agreement is not subjected to any contingency or condition.

#### 6. Use of Documents

All documents, including but not limited to drawings, specifications and data or programs stored electronically, prepared by JPA are related exclusively to the services described in this Agreement. Any modifications made by the Client to any of the JPA's documents, or any partial use or reuse of the documents without written authorization or adaptation by JPA will be at the Client's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to JPA, and the Client shall indemnify, defend and hold the Construction harmless from all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including but not limited to attorney's fees, resulting there from. Any authorization or adaptation will entitle JPA to further compensation at rates to be agreed upon by the Client and JPA.

#### 7. Opinions of Cost

Because JPA does not control the cost of labor, materials, equipment or services furnished by others, methods of determining prices, or competitive bidding or market conditions, any opinions rendered as to costs, including but not limited to opinions as to the costs of construction and materials, shall be made on the basis of its experience and represent its judgment as an experienced and qualified professional, familiar with the industry. JPA cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids or actual costs will not vary from its opinions of cost. If the client wishes great assurance as to the amount of any cost, it shall employ an independent cost estimator. JPA's services required to bring costs within any limitation established by the Client will be paid for as Additional Services.

#### 8. Termination

The obligation to provide further services under this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon seven days written notice. In the event of any termination, JPA shall be paid for all services rendered and expenses incurred to the effective date of termination, and other reasonable expenses incurred by JPA as a result of such termination. If JPA's compensation is a fixed fee, the amount payable for services will be proportional amount of the total fee based on the ratio of the amount of the services performed, as reasonably determined by JPA, to the total amount of services which were to have been performed, less prior partial payments.

#### 9. Insurance

JPA is protected by Professional liability insurance for E & O and will exchange certificates of insurance upon request. If the Client directs JPA to obtain increased insurance coverage, or if the nature of JPA's activities requires additional insurance coverage, JPA will take out such additional insurance, if obtainable, at the Client's expenses. Following is a summary of JPA's insurance coverage:

- a. Professional Liability coverage in the amount of \$ 1,000,000.00 for each occurrence with \$1,000,000.00 general aggregate.
- b. General Liability Insurance coverage in the amount of \$ 1,000,000.00 for each occurrence with \$2,000,000.00 general aggregate.

### 10. Liability

In performing its professional services, JPA will use that degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised, under similar circumstances, by reputable members of its profession in the same locality at the time the services are provided. No warranty, express or implied, is made or intended by JPA's undertaking herein or its performance of services, and it is agreed that JPA is not a fiduciary with respect to the client. JPA agrees that during the period in which an action otherwise could be brought against it JPA will hold the Client harmless from loss, damage, injury, or liability arising directly and solely from the negligent acts or omissions of JPA, its employees, agents, subcontractors and their employees and agents but only to the extent set forth as follows. To the fullest extent of the law, and notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, the total liability, in the aggregate of JPA and JPA's officers, directors, employees, agents, and subconsultants to the Client or to anyone claiming by, through or under the Client, for any and all claims, losses, costs or damages whatsoever arising out of, resulting from or in any way related to the services under this Agreement from any cause or causes, including but not limited to, the negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability or breach of contract or any warranty, express or implied, of JPA's or JPA's officers, directors, employees, agents, and subconsultants, shall not exceed the total compensation received by JPA under this Agreement or \$25,000.00 whichever is greater. Under no circumstances shall JPA be liable for lost profits or consequential damages, for extra costs or other consequences due to change conditions or for costs related to the failure of contractors to perform work in accordance with the plans and specifications.

ANY CLAIM FOR CONSTRUCTION DEFECTS IS SUBJECT TO NOTICE AND CURE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 588, FLORIDA STATUTES.

#### 11. Certifications

Guarantees and Warranties: JPA shall not be required to execute any document that would result in its certifying, guaranteeing or warranting the existence of conditions whose existence JPA cannot ascertain.

#### 12. Expenses of Litigation

If litigation or arbitration related to the services performed is initiated against JPA by the Client, its contractors, or subcontractors, the prevailing party shall be entitled to payment by the other party of reasonable cost, charges and expenses, including attorney's fees relating to such action through all levels of proceedings, expended or incurred in connection therewith by the prevailing party.

#### 13. Dispute Resolution

All claims by the either party arising out of this Agreement or its breach shall be submitted first to mediation in accordance with the Construction Industry Mediation Rules of American Arbitration Association as a condition precedent to litigation. Any mediation or civil action by the Client must be commenced within one year of the accrual of the cause of action asserted but in no event later than allowed by applicable statues.

#### 14. Hazardous Substances and Conditions

Unless stated in the scope of services, it is agreed that the Client does not request JPA to perform any services or to make any determinations involving hazardous substances or conditions, as defined by federal or state law.

#### 15. Construction Phase Services

- a. If JPA's services include the preparation of documents to be used for construction, JPA shall not be responsible for any interpretation of the intent of its documents if it is not retained and paid for periodic site visits. If JPA is contracted to perform inspections, it is JPA's responsibility to report and inform Client of contractor's progress of work and standard workmanship.
- b. JPA shall have no responsibility for any contractor's means, methods, techniques, equipment choice and usage, sequence, schedule, safety programs, or safety practices, nor shall JPA have any authority or responsibility to stop or direct the work of any contractor. JPA's visit will be for the purpose of endeavoring to provide the Client a greater degree of confidence that the completed work of its contractors will generally conform to the construction documents prepared by JPA. JPA neither guarantees the performance of contractors, nor assumes responsibility for any contractor's failure to perform its work in accordance with the contract documents.
  - The Client agrees that each contract with any contractor shall state that the contractor shall be solely responsible for job site safety and for its mean and methods; that the contractor shall indemnify the
- c. Client and JPA for all claims and liability arising out of job site accidents; and that the Client and JPA shall be made additional insured under the contractor's general liability insurance policy.

#### 16. Assignment and Subcontracting

This Agreement gives no rights or benefits to anyone other than the Client and JPA and all duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole benefit of the Client and JPA. Neither the Client nor JPA shall assign or transfer any rights under or interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the other. However, nothing herein shall prevent or restrict JPA from retaining independent professional associates, subconsultants, and suppliers as JPA may deem appropriate.

#### 17. Confidentiality

The Client consents to the use and dissemination by JPA of photographs of the project and to the use by JPA of facts, data and information obtained by JPA in the performance of its services. If, however, any facts, data or information are specifically identified in writing by the Client as confidential, JPA shall use reasonable care to maintain the confidentiality of that material.

#### 18. Miscellaneous Provisions

This Agreement is to be governed by the law of the State of Florida. This Agreement shall bind, and the benefits, thereof shall inure to, the parties hereto, their legal representatives, executors, administrators, successors and assigns. This Agreement contains the entire and fully integrated agreement between the parties, and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous negotiations, representations, agreements or understandings, whether written or oral. This agreement can be supplemented or amended only by a written document executed by both parties. Any provisions in this Agreement that is unenforceable in any jurisdiction shall, as to such jurisdiction, be ineffective to the extent of such unenforceability without invalidating the remaining provisions or affecting the validity or enforceability of such provision in any other jurisdiction. The non-enforcement of any provision by either party shall not constitute a waiver of that provision nor shall it affect the enforceability of that provision or of the remainder of this Agreement.

#### 19. Ownership of Design

All parties acknowledge and agree that all designs contemplated by or created pursuant to this agreement are instruments of service and shall remain the sole property of JPA. This agreement and fees quoted are for a single licensed use by the Client of the building plans and other documents created. JPA hereby grants to Client a license to use the building plans and other documents created under this agreement after payment in full is received of all fees and expenses. Any use of the plans, other than the single license use thereof, shall not be permitted without the advance, written consent of JPA.

20.NOTWITHSTANDING any paragraph of this Letter Agreement, pursuant to Florida Statute Section 588.0035, as that statute may now exist or hereafter amended, an individual, employee, or agent of the Architect may not be held individually liable for negligence.

# Scope of Services

# Task 1 – Construction Phase Services

Design team involvement during the construction phase can help to resolve issues that may arise, clarify contractor questions and provide oversight for material selections during construction observation site visits. *Additional meetings or site visits will be subject to the rate of \$1,100 per visit (including mileage).* 



# **Task 1.1: Landscape Architecture**

- Perform up to three (3) monthly site visits to observe construction progress and/or meet with the Client and Contractor. Each site visit will include an observation report and associated site photos in PDF format sent to the Owner and Contractor.
- Perform a Final Walkthrough at the substantial completion and prepare a Site Work punch list for review by the contractor.
- Review of CM pay applications.
- Review and approval of as-built drawings as provided to S&ME by the Construction Manager.

# Task 1.2: Civil Engineering

As part of this task, S&ME will:

- Review shop drawings for site improvements. All submittals must be submitted and approved by CM prior to review and approval by S&ME. All shop drawing and submittal review to be submitted to S&ME in conjunction with Holland Park Phase II project submittals.
- Coordinate contractor questions and RFI responses. All RFIs must be submitted in writing to the City and CM prior to review and response by S&ME.
- Perform up to one (1) site visits to observe construction progress and/or meet with the Client and Contractor. Each site visit will include an observation report and associated site photos in PDF format sent to the Owner and Contractor.

- Assist in review of CM pay applications.
- Review and approval of as-built drawings as provided to S&ME by the Construction Manager.

## Task 1.3: Electrical Engineering

- Responses to contractors' Electrical requests for information (RFIs) during construction. All RFIs must be submitted in writing to the City and CM prior to review and response by S&ME.
- Perform a Final Walkthrough at the substantial completion of the Phase for review of Electrical installation and preparation of report.
- Assist in review of CM pay applications.
- Review and approval of as-built drawings as provided to by the Construction Manager.

#### Background:

\*Please note-The attached incentive agreement is under final review by the company's legal staff and will be updated before the business meeting.

CP Performance (formerly known as Project Price is Right) is the world's leading marine mail order superstore for performance boating needs. Located in Santa Rosa, CA and Palm Coast, FL, they manufacture and distribute over 3,000 OEM and after-market performance marine parts, cleaners, and safety equipment. The company has decades of experience manufacturing marine components and uses the latest techniques to offer customers a large library of technical support.

Recently, CP Performance was evaluating in expanding their operations in Palm Coast or consolidating in another area. Over the last few months, the City of Palm Coast, in cooperation with the Flagler County Department of Economic Opportunity (Flagler County DEO), have engaged with the company and worked through their indicated needs and desire to expand.

Since CP Performance was looking at locations outside Flagler County and the City of Palm Coast, the City and Flagler County DEO offered technical assistance and proposed possible economic development incentives to CP Performance in Palm Coast. The proposed economic development incentives are subject to review and approval by City Council, as the company now desires to consolidate its operations in Palm Coast.

CP Performance plans construct the 20,000 to 30,000 square foot facility in Palm Coast's Hargrove Grade Industrial Park. The company's move from California will create approximately 20 new jobs with an immediate capital investment of \$3 million.

As proposed economic incentives, City staff have developed and are proposing a performance-based local economic development incentive package for City Council's consideration. The value of the incentive package is estimated at \$35,000 payable paid through economic development incentive funds and only if company meets stated job creation/retention goals. The incentive package includes the following:

- Extensions of the City's Fiber Optic Network (FiberNET) at no costs
- Waiver of planning application and planning permitting fees
- Offset of City water, sewer and transportation fees
- Stormwater accommodations

In addition, due to the location of CP Performance being adjacent to the City's Public Work Facility, the City is obtaining an easement and right-of-way-across CP Performance's property to optimize the space on both properties. This easement will allow for a new entrance to be created for the City's Public Works Facility.

Please note that Flagler County has approved a \$90,000 new construction, performance-based inventive package as well with a ten-year payout at their October 15, 2018 meeting.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PALM COAST, FLORIDA, APPROVING THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVE AGREEMENT AND RELATED EASEMENT AGREEMENT WITH CP PERFORMANCE; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER, OR DESIGNEE, TO EXECUTE SAID AGREEMENTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, CP Performance, originally known as "Project Price is Right", is an existing online marine product superstore that has chosen to consolidate its operations in Palm Coast; and

**WHEREAS,** CP Performance considered a location both inside and outside the City of Palm Coast, Florida, to expand operations; and

**WHEREAS,** the City desires to provide CP Performance economic incentives in furtherance of the municipal purpose of recruiting CP Performance as an employer and expanding operations within the City limits under Section 166.021(9), Florida Statutes; and

**WHEREAS**, CP Performance is expected to create an additional 20 new positions with an average wage of at least \$36,000 within the new 20,000-30,000 square-foot facility; and

WHEREAS, the City of Palm Coast desires to provide CP Performance economic incentives in furtherance of the municipal purpose of retaining CP Performance as a major employer within the City of Palm Coast; and

**WHEREAS,** in addition to traditional economic incentives, the City of Palm Coast desires to enter into an easement agreement with CP Performance to provide a common border, as CP Performance is adjacent to the City of Palm Coast Public Works facility; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds and declares that this Agreement serves a public purpose, which includes promotion of economic development, job growth, future expansion of the City's tax base, and improvement of public infrastructure.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PALM COAST, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. APPROVAL OF AGREEMENTS. The City Council of the City of Palm Coast hereby approves the terms and conditions of the Economic Development Incentive Agreement and the Easement Agreement with CP Performance, as attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit "A."

**SECTION 2. AUTHORIZATION TO EXECUTE.** The City Manager, or designee, is hereby authorized to execute the necessary documents.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Resolution are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Resolution shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this Resolution.

**SECTION 4. CONFLICTS.** All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict with any of the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 5. IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS.** The City Manager is hereby authorized to take any actions necessary to implement the action taken in this Resolution.

**SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and adoption.

- WHEREAS, the CP Performance, a company currently located in Santa Rosa, California, is considering relocating to the City of Palm Coast or expanding its operations in Santa Rosa; and

- WHEREAS, the City desires to provide CP Performance economic incentives in furtherance of the municipal purpose of recruiting CP Performance as an employer and expanding the Hardin Marine operations within the City limits under Section 166.021(9), Florida Statutes; and
- WHEREAS, in addition to retaining the existing sister company employment and capital investment in the City of Palm Coast, the Company will construct a new 20,000 to 30,000 square foot industrial facility; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Company will create approximately 20 new employment opportunities over the next five years and invest approximately \$3M capital investment; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Company project site is adjacent to the City of Palm Coast Public Works facility, which the ultimate expansion thereof will require an easement and right-of-way across the CP Performances property; and
- **WHEREAS**, due to both parties needs to optimize land to the full potential, the City proposes to provide a common border with CP Performance; and
- WHEREAS, the City desires to enter into an easement agreement with CP Performance to accommodate for future stormwater areas and right-of-way as an additional economic incentive; and

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that this Agreement is necessary to define the incentives and ensure that the economic incentives provided by the City to CP Performance ultimately serve their intended municipal purpose; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has established terms and conditions herein whereby CP Performance, by complying with these terms and conditions, can receive the benefit outlined in this Agreement, and

WHEREAS, the parties agree that the economic incentives provided by the City hereunder are for the benefit of the public health, safety, welfare and convenience of the citizens of the City of Palm Coast, Florida and Flagler County; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and declares that this Agreement serves a public purpose, which includes promotion of economic development, job growth, future expansion of the City's tax base, and improvement of public infrastructure.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, and other good and valuable consideration, which the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The foregoing recitals are deemed true and accurate and are fully incorporated herein by reference.
- **Definitions.** For purposes of this Agreement, the following terms and words shall have the meaning ascribed to them, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
  - (a) "County" Shall mean Flagler County, Florida.
  - (b) "Easement Property" shall mean a portion of Property to allow vehicular traffic and public utilities from the terminus of Industrial Drive to the adjacent City Public Works facility, which is legally described on **EXHIBIT "B"** and which CP Performance will convey a perpetual easement to the City for public right-of-way and utility purposes.
  - (c) "Effective Date" shall be the date on which the last signatory hereto shall execute this Agreement, and it shall be the date on which this Agreement shall go into effect. The Agreement shall not be effective against any part until said date.
  - (d) "Jobs" shall have the meaning given to such terms in Section 288.106(2)(i), Florida Statutes.
  - (e) "Property" shall mean the real property owned by CP Performance located within the City of Palm Coast, known as Parcel Number 10-11-30-0000-01010-0010 and legally described on **EXHIBIT "A."**

#### 3. Commitment by CP Performance

- (a) CP Performance will design, permit and construct a 20,000 to 30,000 square foot light industrial facility on Parcel Number 10-11-30-0000-01010-0010, in the City of Palm Coast for purposes of locating its business operation within the City of Palm Coast; and
- (b) CP Performance will locate its headquarters in the newly constructed facility; and

- (c) CP Performance will obtain all applicable City permits and permits required by other governmental agencies for the construction of the facility no later than December 31, 2019; and
- (d) CP Performance will obtain a certificate of occupancy for this facility prior to December 31, 2020 and occupy the newly constructed facility; and
- (e) CP Performance agrees to use commercially reasonable best efforts to establish and maintain a minimum of twenty new Jobs at the City of Palm Coast location within five years of the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- (f) In exchange for the commitments by the City below, CP Performance will convey to the City a perpetual public right-of-way and utility easement over, under and across the Easement Property that facilitates public utilities and the access for vehicular traffic into the Palm Coast public works facility from Industry Drive (detailed on Exhibit B). The Easement shall not unreasonably interfere with CP Performance's construction of the facility. The easement documents shall be in a form prepared by the City's attorney and will be reviewed, approved and executed by both parties. The conveyance shall be completed no later than six (6) months from the Effective Date of this Agreement. The City will record the executed easement document in the Official Records of Flagler County, Florida at its expenses.
- (g) As it is likely that the CP Performance site will be constructed prior to the Palm Coast Public Works Facility site improvements, CP Performance agrees to design, permit and construct, at its expense, a stormwater conveyance system and pond on the southern end of the Palm Coast Public Works property, known as Parcel ID# 10-11-30-0000-01010-0011. The City shall be have the right to approve the design and final location of the stormwater conveyance system and pond, and said approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. The proposed location of the stormwater pond is depicted on <a href="Exhibit "C." The stormwater pond will be sized to accommodate stormwater flow generated from the construction of the new CP Performance industrial facility and the future Palm Coast Public Works Facility. CP Performance will be responsible to remove the excavated soil from the stormwater pond from the City property.

#### 4.0 Commitments by the City

- (a) The City shall extend the City's Fiber Optic Network (City FiberNET) to CP Performance's property, at no cost to CP Performance.
- (b) The City shall waive all planning application and planning permit fees in connection with the construction of the new industrial building contemplated in subsection 3.0 (a). In addition, the City shall expedite permitting for the industrial building, whenever possible and feasible.
- (c) The City shall waive applicable City water, sewer and transportation impact fees and stormwater fees due in connection with the construction of the new industrial building planned to be completed by CP Performance as required subsection 3.0 (a). Waived fees will be offset by other available City funding resources including of the future property taxes resulting from the construction of the new industrial building.
- (d) In exchange for the perpetual public right-of-way and utility easement to be provided by CP Performance pursuant to subsection 3.0(d), the City proposes a common border with CP Performance and agrees to accept any and all stormwater from the site in connection with the construction of the new 20,000-30,000 square foot building, in perpetuity, in accordance with City of Palm Coast stormwater regulations, and in accordance with FAC 40C. The city is

- receiving the stormwater in its natural and unimproved state in accordance with local, state, and federal regulations.
- (e) At such time the perpetual public right-of-way and utility easement is conveyed to the City by CP Performance, pursuant to subsection 3.0(d), the City shall also accommodate, at no cost to CP Performance, on City property (located adjacent and to the north of the Property), CP Performance's existing storm water detention located on the Easement Property to off-set any reduction of storm water capacity resulting from the conveyance. Any disturbance of the CP Performance property, resulting from the City's construction activities shall be repaired or replaced by the City at no cost to CP Performance.
- (f) In exchange for the commitments by CP Performance above, the City will convey to CP Performance a perpetual utility easement over, under and across the property that facilitates the transmission of stormwater flow to the City stormwater pond (detailed on Exhibit C). The easement documents shall be in a form prepared by the City's attorney and will be reviewed, approved and executed by both parties. The conveyance shall be completed no later than six (6) months from the Effective Date of this Agreement. The City will record the executed easement document in the Official Records of Flagler County, Florida at its expenses.
- **5.0** <u>Progress Reports.</u> On an annual basis, if requested by the City, CP Performance shall submit a written progress report as to the number of employees employed by CP Performance at its offices within the City of Palm Coast for a period of five years from the execution of this Agreement.
- **6.0** Compliance with Laws. CP Performance shall be responsible for complying with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and lawful orders of any public authority regarding the location and continued operation of its business within the City of Palm Coast.
- 7.0 Work is a Private Undertaking. With regards to CP Performance's business operations and compliance with applicable laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations, it is specifically understood and agreed to by and between the parties hereto that the contractual relationship between the City and CP Performance is such that CP Performance is an independent contractor and not an agent of the City. CP Performance and its contractors, partners, agents, and employees are independent contractor and not employees of the City. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted to establish any relationship other than that of an independent contractor, between the City, on one hand, and CP Performance and its contractors, Partners, employees, or agents, under this Agreement.
- **8.0** Compliance Monitoring. CP Performance shall be responsible for complying with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, and lawful orders of any public authority regarding the location and continued operation of its business within City of Palm Coast.
- **9.0** Audit and Inspections; Job Compliance Check. CP Performance agrees that, until such time as the construction of the new industrial building has been completed and a certificate of occupancy has been issued by the City, any records with respect to CP Performance's Obligations to the City Under this Agreement shall be made available to the City, at any time during normal business hours upon seventy-two (72) hours written notice to CP Performance, to audit, examine, and make excerpt or transcripts of all data relevant confirming that CP Performance compliance with the Agreement. Any audit shall be conducted to Government Auditing Standards, or Generally Acceptable Auditing Standards, as applicable at the time of audit. Notwithstanding the foregoing, (1) CP Performance shall not be required to make available any documents or information that (i) are attorney/ client privileged, (ii) constitute a trade secret under the Uniform Trade Secret Act, or (iii) which are determined exempt from disclosure

under Florida's Public Records Laws as trade secrets; and (2) with respect to any information regarding the amount of employee wages for specific Jobs, the City shall (a) treat such information as confidential, (b) not release such information to any third party, (c) not take any notes with respect to the information reviewed, and (d) not make any copies of any of the information reviewed, Any deficiencies noted in audit reports prepared by the City must be fully cleared by CP Performance within thirty (30) days after notice of said deficiencies were received by CP Performance. Failure of CP Performance to reasonably comply with the above audit requirements will constitute a material breach of this Agreement and may result, at the sole discretion of the City and as may be applicable, in the withholding of future economic incentives, terminating pending economic incentives, the reimposition of any ad valorem taxes abated under this Agreement, or termination of any other obligation required hereunder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the parties agree to submit any dispute under this Paragraph to nonbinding mediation before the City's exercise of its rights hereunder for alleged violation by CP Performance.

- 10.0 <u>Promotion of Economic Incentives.</u> Either party may issue news releases, public announcements, advertisements, or other form of publicity concerning it efforts in connection with this Agreement. However, unless otherwise agreed, the party publicizing its efforts shall provide a courtesy copy of any written material to the other party for review and comments prior to publication.
- 11.0 <u>Severability.</u> Should any paragraph or any part of any paragraph of this Agreement be rendered void, invalid, or enforceable by any paragraph of this Agreement to render, void, invalid, or enforceable any other paragraph or any part of any paragraph in this Agreement.
- 12.0 <u>Integration; Modification; Exhibits.</u> The drafting, execution, and delivery of this Agreement by the parties has not been induced by any representations, statements, warranties, or agreements other than those expressed herein. This Agreement embodies the entire understanding of the parties, and there are no further or other agreements or understandings, written or oral, in effect between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof unless expressly referred to herein. Modifications of this Agreement shall only be made in writing signed by both parties. The exhibits attached to this Agreement are incorporated herein and shall be considered a part of this Agreement for the purposes stated herein, except if there is conflict between an exhibit and provisions of this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail over the exhibit.
- **13.0** Attorney's Fees. Unless otherwise provided herein, each party agrees to bear their own attorney fees and cost in furtherance of this Agreement.
- **14.0** <u>Headings.</u> All headings in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not be used to interpret or construe its provisions.
- 15.0 <u>Waiver.</u> No failure to insist on the prompt performance by CP Performance of its obligations under this Agreement shall be construed as a waiver by the City of its rights to demand performance. Further, any waiver by the City of any breach or violation of CP Performance's Obligations under this Agreement shall not be construed as continuing waiver or consent to any subsequent breach or violation or impede the City's ability to enforce the terms of this Agreement.
- 16.0 Notices. All notices required or permitted under this Agreement and any written consents or approvals requires hereunder shall be in writing (including telecopy communication) and shall be (as elected by the person giving such notice) hand-delivered by messenger or overnight courier service, telecopied or mailed by registered or certified mail (postage pre-paid), returned receipt requested, and

addressed to each party at their respective addresses as set forth below or to such other addresses any party may designate by notice complying with the terms of this Paragraph:

Such notice, request, or other communication shall be considered given and deemed delivered: (a) on the date delivered if by personal delivery or courier service; (b) on the date of transmission with confirmed answer back if by telecopier if transmitted prior to 5:00 p.m. on a business day, and on the next business day if transmitted after 5:00 p.m. or on a non-business day, provided that copy of the notice is provided within two business days thereafter by one of the other methods permitted by this Paragraph: or (c) on the date upon which the return receipt is signed or delivery is refused or the notice is designated by the postal authorities as not deliverable, as the case may be, if mailed.

#### 17. Term; Termination; Termination by Parties.

- (a) The City and CP Performance acknowledge and agree that CP Performance's performance under the terms of this Agreement is conditioned upon the approval by the State of Florida of other agreements related to CP Performance's business operations. CP Performance shall have the right to either accept or reject this Agreement until March 31, 2019, at 5:00 P.M. EST ("Acceptance Date"). On or before the Acceptance Date, CP Performance shall deliver to the City written confirmation of its acceptance of the Agreement. In the event such acceptance confirmation is not delivered to the City prior to the Acceptance Date, this Agreement shall be deemed terminated and shall be null and void and of no further force and effect and the parties shall have no further obligations hereunder.
- (b) In the event either party shall fail to satisfy any of its material obligations set forth in this Agreement, the non-defaulting party shall provide the defaulting party written notice of such default. The defaulting party shall then have thirty (30) days from receipt of such notice to cure such default. If the defaulting party shall fail to cure the default within the thirty (30) day time period, or such additional time period mutually agreed to by the parties, then the non-defaulting party may exercise any of its rights and

remedies provided by law including, but not limited to, termination of this Agreement or injunctive and other equitable relief to prevent a default of this Agreement and to secure the performance of this Agreement by the defaulting party. Upon termination of this Agreement, this Agreement shall be null and void and of no further force and effect and the parties shall have no further obligations hereunder.

#### 18. Indemnification and Hold Harmless.

- (a) CP Performance assumes any and all risk of personal injury and property damage to the extent attributable to the intentional and negligent acts or omissions of CP Performance and its officers, employees, servant, and agent thereof while acting within the scope of their employment with CP Performance and performing CP Performance requirements and obligations under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. The City assumes any and all risks of personal injury and property damages to the extent attributable to the intentional and negligent acts or omissions of the City's officers, employees, servants, and obligations of the City under this Agreement. Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, CP Performance and the City further agree that nothing contained herein shall be construed or interpreted as (1) denying to either party any remedy or defense available to such party under the laws of the State of Florida; or (2) a waiver of sovereign immunity of the City beyond the waiver provided in Section 768.28, Florida Statues. The limits of liability on the City set forth in section 768.28, Florida Statues are hereby fully incorporated herein by this reference. This Paragraph shall survive termination of this Agreement.
- (b) The obligations arising under this Paragraph 18.0 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, as to claims or causes of action, liabilities, expenses, losses, costs, reasonable attorney's fees, damages, fines and penalties of every kind and character or incurred of suffered by the City as a result thereof, based upon events arising prior to the date of termination of this Agreement.
- **19. Assignment.** This Agreement and the conditions provided hereunder shall not be assigned by CP Performance without the prior written consent of the City.
- **20.** No City Obligation for Future Funds. No provisions in this Agreement shall be constructed as requiring the City to provide additional economic incentives of any kind, other than as specifically provided herein.
- 21. Conflict of Interest. CP Performance represents and warrants, and this Agreement is being made by the City in reliance thereon, that CP Performance and its officers, employees, and agents are neither officers nor employees of the City. Further, that no consideration of any kind is being paid, transferred, or conveyed directly to any City officer or employee, or indirectly to any City officer or employee through some other third party including a relative or legal entity, for the City's commitment to enter into this Agreement.
- **22.** Representations of CP Performance. CP Performance represents to the City that (i) CP Performance is an entity Duly authorized to conduct business in Florida; (ii) CP Performance has the authority to enter into the Agreement and perform the requirements of this Agreement; (iii) to CP Performance best knowledge, CP Performance's performance under this Agreement shall not violate any applicable judgment, order, law or regulation; (iv) to CP Performance's best knowledge, CP Performance's performance under this Agreement shall not result in the creation of any claims against the City for Money or performance, any lien, charge, encumbrance or security interest upon any asset of the City; (v) CP Performance shall have sufficient capital to perform its obligations under this Agreement: and (vi) CP Performance does not require any third party consent to execute, deliver and perform it obligations under this Agreement unless otherwise stated in this Agreement.

- **23.** CP Performance Continuing Disclosure Requirement. CP Performance must promptly notify the City of any developments that materially and adversely impact this Agreement and CP Performance's obligations stated herein including, but not limited to, compliance with all applicable laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to clean air permits, initiation any law suits or bankruptcy proceedings, sale or conveyance of real property, labor disputes, and changes in business operations.
- **24.** No Delegation of Police Power. CP Performance shall not pledge the credit of the City nor make the City a guarantor of payment or surety for any contract, debt, or obligation, judgment, lien, or any form of indebtedness. The parties agree that this Agreement does not nor shall it be constructed as delegation of any of the City's authority or police powers to CP Performance.

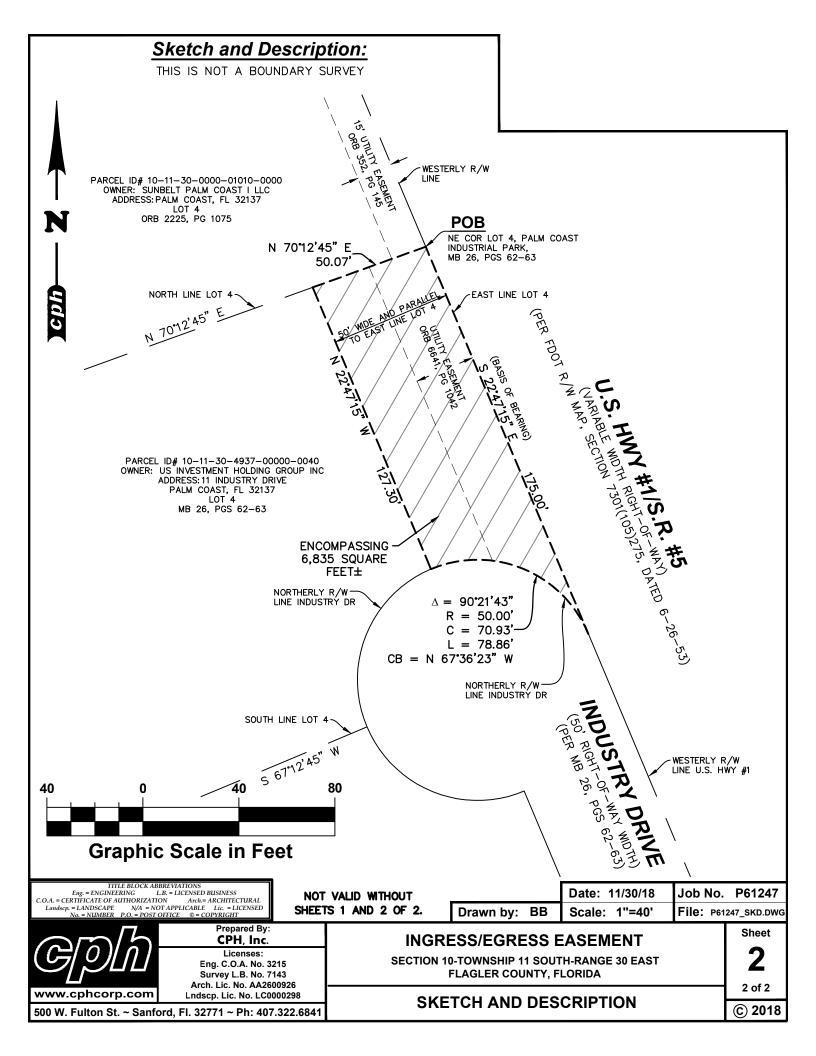

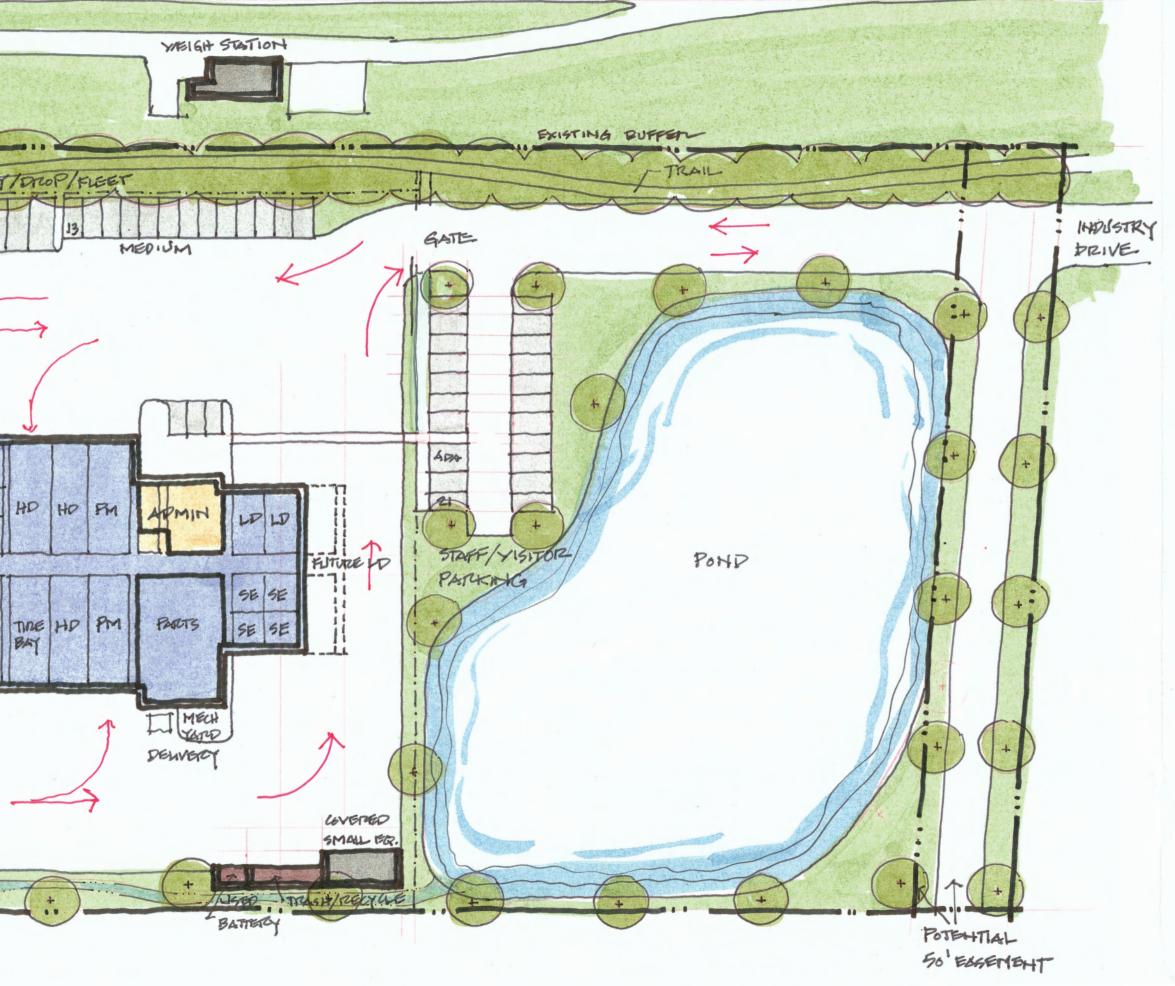

#### Background:

The purpose of the amendment is to reflect the recent increase in the benefit limits provided under Section 457(e)(11)(B)(ii) of the Internal Revenue Code. Currently, the plan limits the benefits payable per year of service to \$3,000, in accordance with the former provision of the Internal Revenue Code. The tax Cuts and Jobs Act (December 2017) increased the benefit limit from \$3,000 to \$6,000. This ordinance, which was approved by the Board of Trustees at its quarterly meeting on February 15, 2019, amends the plan to reflect the new \$6000 benefit limit under the Internal Revenue Code.

Adopt Ordinance 2019-XX amending Chapter 2, Article IV, Volunteer Firefighter Retirement Fund.

**Sec. 2-540.** - **Maximum pension**. Notwithstanding any provision of this division to the contrary, the aggregate amount of length of service awards (including all benefits under this division, such as retirement, disability, supplemental benefits) accruing for any member under the system with respect to any year of credited service shall not exceed the limit set forth in Section 457(e)(11)(B)(ii) of the Internal Revenue Code.

SECTION 2 AMENDMENT SECTION 2-549 SUPPLEMENTAL BENEFIT. Chapter 2, Administration, Article VI, Retirement, Division 2, Volunteer Firefighter Retirement System and Trust Fund, Section 2-549, Supplemental Benefit, subsection (j)., is hereby amended to read as follows:

(j) Maximum benefit. Notwithstanding any provision of this division to the contrary, the aggregate amount of length of service awards (including all benefits under this division, such as retirement, disability, supplemental benefits) accruing

It is the intention of the City Council of the City of Palm Coast, Florida, and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinance of the City of Palm Coast, Florida; that the Sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or re-lettered to accomplish such intention; that the word, "Ordinance" may be changed to "Section," "Article," or other appropriate word.

**SECTION 5. CONFLICTS.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

#### Background:

As development has increased so have wastewater flows and demands, and the need for additional pipe capacity. The City of Palm Coast tasked McKim & Creed to design an upgrade to the sanitary sewer force main system from Pump Station 24-2, near the intersection of Pritchard Drive and Whiteview Parkway, to the force main along Old Kings Road. Installing a 16" parallel force main will provide relief to the existing wastewater collection system and accommodate future development. McKim & Creed recently completed the design of the Pump Station 24-2 Force Main Crossing project.

The City advertised the project (ITB-CD-19-10) and on February 28, 2019 received 4 bids that were deemed to be responsive and responsible bidders.

The project design engineer and City staff recommend award of the project to the low bidder, Hazen Construction, LLC, for \$494,445.00. In addition, staff recommends including the additive alternate, \$27,605.00, for installation of a 2" PVC fiber optic conduit for use by the IT Department for redundancy. Based on past experience with similar construction projects, staff is requesting a 10% contingency (\$52,205.00), in case of unforeseen circumstances and/or unknown conditions, for a total project cost of \$574,255.00.

This project and the costs associated with it will be incurred over fiscal years 2019 and 2020. Funds for this project are budgeted in the Utility 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan.

#### Background:

The Wastewater Treatment Division uses liquid aluminum sulfate to control phosphorous limits to comply with (FDEP) Florida Department of Environmental Protection permit at Wastewater Treatment Plant #2. Due to a price increase for this chemical, additional funding is needed to purchase this product from Chemtrade.

City staff is recommending that City Council approve piggybacking the St. Johns County Contract (#17-MCC-CHE-07813) with Chemtrade Inc. through January 31, 2020 to purchase liquid aluminum sulfate. Piggybacking existing competitively bid contracts is advantageous since the pricing is generally better than what the City could obtain on its own, and the City does not incur the expense and delay of soliciting a bid.

Since the underlying contract is an agreement on a per unit price basis, City staff will make purchases on an as needed basis using budgeted funds appropriated by City Council. The Fiscal Year 2019 Budget includes available funding in the City's Utility operating budgets to purchase aluminum sulfate. City staff estimates that the City will expend approximately an additional \$28,600 for the remainder of FY 2019 under this piggyback contract. Annually the approximate expenditure will be \$31,000.

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the payment and agreements hereinafter mentioned;

#### ARTICLE 1 - DURATION AND RENEWAL

This Agreement shall become effective on February 1, 2017, shall be in effect for an initial contract term of one (1) calendar year, and may be renewed for up to a maximum of four (4) one (1) year renewal periods, upon satisfactory performance by the Contractor, mutual agreement by both parties, and the availability of funds. While this Agreement may be renewed as stated in this Section, it is expressly noted that the County is under no obligation to extend this Agreement. It is further expressly understood that the option of extension is exercisable only by the County, and only upon the County's determination that the Contractor has satisfactorily performed the Scope of Services noted elsewhere in this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 2 – ENUMERATION OF CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

The term "Contract Documents" shall consist of all Bid Documents and any addenda/exhibits thereto; all Specifications; this Agreement, any duly executed amendments, addenda, and/or exhibits hereto; and any and all duly executed Task Orders, and Change Orders, if applicable. Any representations, whether verbal or written, that are not included in the Contract Documents do not form part of this Contract Agreement.

#### **ARTICLE 3 – SERVICES**

The Contractor's responsibility under this Agreement shall be to provide all labor, materials, and equipment necessary to supply **bulk aluminum sulfate** to the St. Johns County Utility Department, ("SJCUD"), as needed, in accordance with Bid No: 16-54, and as otherwise provided in the Contract Documents.

#### ARTICLE 4 - SCHEDULE

The Contractor shall perform the required services as specified in the Contract Documents. The Contractor shall be required to comply with the schedule set forth in the specifications, and as coordinated with the authorized designee(s) in SJCUD, throughout the duration of this Agreement. No changes to said schedule shall be made without prior written authorization by the County.

#### ARTICLE 5 - COMPENSATION/BILLING/INVOICES

- A. St. Johns County shall compensate the Contractor based upon the unit price per pound of **point five two eight one cents (\$0.5281) per gallon** for **bulk aluminum sulfate**, as submitted in the bid proposal, accepted by the County, and provided herein. The maximum amount available as compensation to the Contractor under this Agreement shall not exceed the annual amount budgeted by SJCUD, unless additional funds become available, or are properly transferred, for services satisfactorily performed in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- B. It is strictly understood that the Contractor is not entitled to the above referenced amount of compensation. Rather, the Contractor's compensation shall be based upon the Contractor's adhering to the Scope of Services, detailed in the Contract Documents. As such, the Contractor's compensation is dependent upon satisfactory completion of services stated in the Specifications, and included by reference in this Agreement.

- C. The Contractor shall bill the County at the end of each month, for Services satisfactorily performed. The County reserves the right to pro-rate or refuse payment of any submitted invoice where services were not satisfactorily performed. The County shall pay the Contractor, for Services satisfactorily performed, in accordance with the Prompt Payment Act, Chapter 218.74(2), Florida Statutes.
- D. Though there is no billing form or format pre-approved by either the County, or the Contractor, bills/invoices submitted by the Contractor shall include the following information at a minimum:
  - Vendor Information (Full Legal Name, Address, Phone, Fax, Email)
  - Date of Invoice, Invoice Number
  - SJC Purchase Order Number, Master Contract Number, Bid Number
  - Unit Price of Product, Total Price of Invoice
  - Quantities Provided, Date(s) of Service, Location(s) Delivered To
- E. <u>Final Invoice</u>: In order for the County and the Contractor to reconcile/close their books and records, the Contractor shall clearly state "Final Invoice" on the Contractor's final/last billing to the County.
- F. Unless otherwise notified, bills/invoices shall be delivered to:

#### ARTICLE 6 - TRUTH-IN-NEGOTIATING CERTIFICATE

The signing of this Agreement by the Contractor shall act as the execution of a truth-in-negotiation certificate, certifying that the wage rates and cost used to determine the compensation provided for this Agreement are accurate, complete and current as of the date of this Agreement.

The said rates and costs shall be reduced to exclude any significant sums should the county determine that the rates and costs were increased due to inaccurate, incomplete or non-current wage rate, or due to inaccurate representations of fees paid to outside subcontractors. The County may exercise its rights under this Article 6 within eighteen (18) months following final payment.

#### **ARTICLE 7 – TERMINATION**

- A. This Agreement may be terminated by the County without cause upon at least thirty (30) consecutive calendar days advance written notice to the Contractor of such termination without cause.
- B. This Contract may be terminated by the County with cause upon at least fourteen (14) consecutive calendar days advance written notice of such termination with cause. Such written notice shall indicate the exact cause for termination.

#### ARTICLE 8 - NOTICE OF DEFAULT/RIGHT TO CURE

- A. Should the Contractor fail to perform (default) under the terms of this Agreement, then the County shall provide written notice to the Contractor; such notice shall include a timeframe of no fewer than five (5) consecutive calendar days in which to cure the default. Failure by the Contractor to cure the default, or take acceptable corrective action within the timeframe provided in the Notice of Default (or any such amount of time as mutually agreed to by the parties in writing), shall constitute cause for termination of this Agreement.
- B. It is expressly noted that, should the County issue three (3) Notices of Default to the Contractor, during the term of this Agreement, such action shall constitute cause for termination of this Agreement.
- C. Consistent with other provisions in this Contract, the Contractor shall be paid for deliveries authorized and satisfactorily performed under this Agreement until the effective date of the termination.
- D. Upon receipt of a Notice of Default, except as otherwise directed by the County in writing, the Contractor shall:
  - 1. Stop work on the date to the extent specified.
  - 2. Terminate and settle all orders and subcontracts relating to this Agreement.

- 3. Transfer all work in process, completed work, and other material related to the terminated work to the County.
- 4. Continue and complete all parts of the work that have not been terminated.

#### ARTICLE 9 - PERSONNEL

The Contractor represents that it has, or shall secure, at its own expense, all necessary personnel required to perform the required services as provided herein. It is expressly understood that such personnel shall not be employees of, or have any contractual relationship with the County.

All of the services required hereunder shall be performed by the Contractor, or under its supervision. All personnel engaged in performed the required services shall be fully qualified and, if required, authorized or permitted under federal, state, and local law to perform such services.

Any changes or substitutions in the Contractor's key personnel must be made known to the County's representative and written approval granted by the County before said change or substitution can become effective.

The Contractor warrants that all services shall be performed by skilled and competent personnel to the highest professional standards in the field.

#### ARTICLE 10 - SUBCONTRACTING

St. Johns County reserves the right to approve the use of any subcontractor, or to reject the selection of a particular subcontractor, and to inspect all facilities of any subcontractors in order to make a determination as to the capability of the subcontractor to perform the Services described in the Contract Documents. The Contractor is encouraged to seek minority and women business enterprises for participation in subcontracting opportunities.

If a subcontractor fails to satisfactorily perform in accordance with the Contract Documents, and it is necessary to replace the subcontractor to complete the Services in a timely fashion, the Contractor shall promptly do so, subject to approval by the County.

The County reserves the right to disqualify any subcontractor, vendor, or material supplier based upon prior unsatisfactory performance.

#### ARTICLE 11 - FEDERAL AND STATE TAX

In accordance with Local, State, and Federal law, the County is exempt from the payment of Sales and Use Taxes. The County shall provide the appropriate Tax Exempt Certificate to the Contractor, upon request. The Contractor shall <u>not</u> be exempt from the payment of all applicable taxes in its performance under this Agreement. It is expressly understood by the County and by the Contractor that the Contractor shall not be authorized to use the County's tax exemption status in any manner

The Contractor shall be solely responsible for the payment and accounting of any and all applicable taxes and/or withholdings including, but not limited to: Social Security payroll taxes (FICA), associated with or stemming from the Contractor's performance under this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 12 – AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

The County's obligations under this Agreement are subject to the availability of lawfully appropriated funds. While the County will make all reasonable efforts, in order to provide funds needed to perform under this Agreement, the County makes no express commitment to provide such funds in any given County Fiscal Year. Moreover, it is expressly noted that the Contractor cannot demand that the County provide any such funds in any given County Fiscal Year.

#### **ARTICLE 13 – INSURANCE**

The Contractor shall not commence work under this Agreement until he/she has obtained all insurance required under this Article and such insurance has been approved by the County. All insurance policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. The Contractor shall furnish proof of insurance to the County prior to the commencement of this Agreement. The certificate(s) shall clearly indicate the Contractor has obtained insurance of the type, amount, and classification as required by this Agreement, and that no material change or cancellations of the insurance shall be effective without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the County. Certificates

shall specifically include the County as Additional Insured for all lines of coverages except Workers' Compensation and Professional Liability. A copy of the endorsement must accompany the certificate. Compliance with the foregoing requirements shall not relieve the Contractor of its liability and obligations under this Agreement.

The Contractor shall maintain during the life of this Agreement, Comprehensive General Liability Insurance with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate, to protect the Contractor from claims of damages for bodily injury, including wrongful death, as well as from claims of property damages which may arise from any operations under this Agreement, whether such operations be by the Contractor or by anyone directly employed by or contracting with the Contractor.

The Contractor shall maintain during the life of this Agreement, Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance with minimum limits of \$300,000 combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage liability to protect the Contractor from claims for damages for bodily injury, including the ownership, use, or maintenance of owned and non-owned automobiles, including rented/hired automobiles whether such operations be by the Contractor or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by the Contractor.

The Contractor shall maintain during the life of this Agreement, adequate Workers' Compensation Insurance in at least such amounts as is required by the law for all of its employees per Florida Statute 440.02.

In the event of unusual circumstances, the County Administrator or his designee may adjust these insurance requirements.

#### **ARTICLE 14 – INDEMNIFICATION**

The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, and employees, from all liabilities, damages, losses, and costs arising under this Agreement, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, to the extend caused by the negligence, recklessness, act, or omission of the Contractor or any other person employed or utilized by the Contractor, whether intentional or unintentional.

#### ARTICLE 15 - SUCCESSORS & ASSIGNS

The County and the Contractor each binds itself and its partners, successors, executors, administrators and assigns to the other party of this Contract Agreement and to the partners, successors, executors, administrators and assigns of such other party, in respect to all covenants of this Agreement. Except as above, neither the County nor the Contractor shall assign, sublet, convey or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the other. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer or agent of the County, which may be a party hereto, nor shall it be construed as giving any rights or benefits hereunder to anyone other than the County and the Contractor.

#### ARTICLE 16 - REMEDIES

No remedy herein conferred upon any party is intended to be exclusive, or any other remedy, and each and every such remedy shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other remedy given hereunder or nor hereafter existing at law or in equity or by statute or otherwise. No single or partial exercise by any party or any right, power, or remedy hereunder shall preclude any other or further exercise thereof.

In any action brought by either party for the enforcement of the obligations of the other party, the prevailing party shall be entitle to recover reasonable attorneys' fees.

#### ARTICLE 17 - CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The Contractor represents that it presently has no interest and shall acquire no interest, either directly or indirectly, which would conflict in any manner with the performance of the obligations required hereunder. The Contractor further represents that no person having any interest shall be employed for said performance.

The Contractor shall promptly notify St. Johns County, in writing, by certified mail of all potential conflicts of interest for any prospective business association, interest or other circumstance, which may influence or appear to influence the Contractor's judgment or quality of performance provided hereunder. Such written notification shall identify the prospective business association, interest or circumstance, the nature of work that the Contractor may undertake and request an opinion of the County, whether such association, interest, or circumstance constitutes a conflict of interest if entered into by the Contractor.

The County agrees to notify the Contractor of its opinion by certified mail within thirty (30) days of receipt of notification by the Contractor. If, in the opinion of the County, the prospective business association, interest, or circumstance would not constitute a conflict of interest by the Contractor, the County shall so state in the notification and the Contractor shall, at his/her option enter into said association, interest, or circumstance and it shall be deemed not in conflict of interest with respect to the scope of work performed by the Contractor under the terms of this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 18 - EXCUSABLE DELAYS

The Contractor shall not be considered in default by reason of any delay in performance if such delay arises out of causes reasonably beyond the Contractor's control and without its fault or negligence. Such cases may include, but are not limited to: Acts of God; the County's ommissive and commissive failures; natural or public health emergencies; freight embargoes; and sever weather conditions.

Upon the Contractor's request, the County shall consider the facts and extend of any delay and, if the Contractor's failure to perform was without its fault or negligence, the Contract Schedule, and/or any other affected provision of this Agreement shall be revised accordingly; subject to the County's right to change, terminate, or stop any or all of the work at any time.

#### **ARTICLE 19 - ARREARS**

The Contractor shall not pledge the County's credit, or make it a guarantor of payment, or surety for any contract, debt, obligation, judgment, lien, or any form of indebtedness. The Contractor further warrants and represents that it has no obligation or indebtedness that would impair its ability to fulfill the terms of this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 20 – INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP

The Contractor is, and shall remain, throughout the duration of this Agreement, an independent contractor, and not an employee, agent, or servant of St. Johns County. All persons engaged in any of the work or services performed pursuant to this Agreement shall, at all times and in all places, be subject to the Contractor's sole discretion, supervision, and control.

The Contractor shall exercise control over the means and manner in which it and its employees perform the work, and in all respects the Contractor's relationship and the relationship of its employees to St. Johns County shall be that of an independent contractor and not as employees or agents of the County. The Contractor does not have the power or authority to bind the County in any promise, agreement, or representation other than specifically provided for in this Agreement.

#### **ARTICLE 21 – CONTINGENT FEE**

The Contractor warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Contractor to solicit or secure this Agreement and that is has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual, or firm, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Contractor, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 22 – ACCESS AND AUDITS

The Contractor shall maintain adequate records to justify all charges, expenses, and costs incurred in performing the work for at least three (3) years after completion of this Agreement. The County shall have access to such books, records, and documents, as required in this section for the purpose of inspection or audit during normal business hours, at the County's cost, upon five (5) days written notice.

#### **ARTICLE 23 – NONDISCRIMINATION**

The Contractor warrants and represents that all of its employees are treated equally during employment without regard to race, color, religion, physical handicap, sex, age, or national origin.

#### ARTICLE 24 - ENTIRETY OF CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT

The County and the Contractor agree that this Agreement, signed by both parties sets forth the entire agreement between the parties, and that there are no promises or understandings other than those stated herein, or are incorporated by reference into this Agreement. None of the provisions, terms, conditions, requirements, or responsibilities noted in this Agreement may be amended, revised, deleted, altered, or otherwise changed, modified, or superseded, except by written instrument, duly executed by authorized representatives of both the County, and the Contractor.

#### **ARTICLE 25 – ENFORCEMENT COSTS**

If any legal action or other proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Agreement, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default, or misrepresentation in connection with any provisions of this Agreement, the successful or prevailing party or parties shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees, court costs and expenses incident to appeals, incurred in that action or proceedings, in addition to any other relief to which such party or parties may be entitled.

#### ARTICLE 26 - AUTHORITY TO PRACTICE

The Contractor hereby represents and warrants that it has and shall continue to maintain all license and approvals required to conduct its business, and that it shall at all times, conduct its business activities in a reputable manner.

#### **ARTICLE 27 – SEVERABILITY**

If any term or provision of this Agreement, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall, to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such items or provision, to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected and every other term and provision of this Agreement shall be deemed valid and enforceable to the extent permitted by law.

#### ARTICLE 28 – AMENDMENTS & MODIFICATIONS

No amendments or modifications of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by each of the parties.

St. Johns County reserves the right to make changes in the work, including alterations, reductions therein or additions thereto. Upon Contractor's receipt of notification from the County of a contemplated change, the Contractor shall: (1) if requested by the County, provide an estimate for the increase or decrease in cost due to the contemplated change; (2) notify the County of any estimated change in the completion date; and (3) advise the County in writing if the contemplated change shall effect the Contractor's ability to meet the completion dates or schedules of this Agreement. If the County instructs in writing, the Contractor shall suspend work on that portion of the project, pending the County's decision to proceed with the change. If the County elects to make the change, the County shall issue a Change Order for changes, or a contract change order, if the original contract is be changed or amended the Contractor shall not commence work on any such change until such written change order has been issued and signed by each of the parties.

#### ARTICLE 29 - FLORIDA LAW AND VENUE

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Any and all legal action necessary to enforce this Agreement shall be held in St. Johns County, FL.

#### ARTICLE 30 - ARBITRATION

The County shall not be obligated to arbitrate or permit any arbitration binding on the County under any of the Contract Documents or in connection with the project in any manner whatsoever.

#### **ARTICLE 31 – NOTICES**

All notices required in this Agreement shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and if sent to the County shall be mailed to:

#### ARTICLE 32 – HEADINGS

The heading preceding the articles and sections herein are solely for convenience of reference and shall not constitute a part of this Agreement, or affect its meaning, construction or effect.

#### ARTICLE 33 - PUBLIC RECORDS

- A. The cost of reproduction, access to, disclosure, non-disclosure, or exemption of records, data, documents, and/or materials, associated with this Agreement shall be subject to the applicable provisions of the Florida Public Records Law (Chapter 119, Florida Statutes), and other applicable State and Federal provisions. Access to such public records, may not be blocked, thwarted, and/or hindered by placing the public records in the possession of a third party, or an unaffiliated party.
- B. In accordance with Florida law, to the extent that Contractor's performance under this Contract constitutes an act on behalf of the County, Contractor shall comply with all requirements of Florida's public records law. Specifically, if Contractor is expressly authorized, and acts on behalf of the County under this Agreement, Contractor shall:
  - (1) Keep and maintain public records that ordinarily and necessarily would be required by the County in order to perform the Services;
  - (2) Upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost as provided in Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, or as otherwise provided by law;
  - (3) Ensure that public records related to this Agreement that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by applicable law for the duration of this Agreement and following completion of this Agreement if the Contractor does not transfer the records to the County; and
  - (4) Upon completion of this Agreement, transfer, at no cost, to the County all public records in possession of the Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the Services.
- C. If the Contractor transfers all public records to the County upon completion of this Agreement, the Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If the Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon completion of this Agreement, the Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the County, upon request from the County's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the County's information technology systems.
- D. Failure by the Contractor to comply with the requirements of this section shall be grounds for immediate, unilateral

termination of this Agreement by the County.

# CITY SERVICES

The City is committed to delivering high-quality services that give us a safe, functional community and allow for growth.

Providing high-quality services to our residents is our No. 1 job! With the rapid growth Palm Coast has experienced, the City strives to continually plan for the need for additional services such as an adequate supply of drinking water, road projects, street lights, drainage improvements, law enforcement and fire protection. The City Council updates the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) annually to provide a safe, functional community and allow for growth.

Big projects completed in 2018 include the opening of a second Wastewater Treatment Plant that adds capacity for our sewer system, adoption of a new street-lighting program for major roadways, implementation of new Flood Insurance Rate Maps for flood zones, transportation safety improvements and the launch of LiDAR, a high-resolution surveying and mapping technology, for assistance with drainage improvements and development.

And there's so much more planned in the coming year and beyond! Everything is designed to make our lives better and set the stage for positive growth and development.

# UTILITIES

The City's original Wastewater Treatment Plant on Utility Drive was built in the early 1970s. Its capacity was expanded over the years, to 6.83 million gallons/day, but it has nearly maxed out.

In 2018, Water Treatment Plant 2 opened off U.S. 1 in northwestern Palm Coast – adding 2 million gallons per day of additional sewer treatment capacity, which is needed for future growth. The new plant produces a highly treated effluent used for irrigation and groundwater recharge, and a reclaimed water main was installed for that purpose. In addition, a Master Pump Station was added in the Matanzas Woods area to support the wastewater system.

The City purchased the Mosquito Control District's former property on Utility Drive to provide office/training space and storage for the Utility Department.

A rate increase for water and wastewater (sewer) was implemented Oct. 1, 2018, to cover increased operating costs and infrastructure improvements.

The Utility took the first steps toward fixedbase meter reading. Installation of the infrastructure will begin in FY2019 and once complete, meters will be read remotely and a portal will be provided to allow customers to read and analyze their own water use data.

FY2018 was a very wet year, starting with Hurricane Irma – resulting in a 32-percent increase in wastewater flows. To reduce overflows caused by heavy rains, the City upgraded several pump stations and installed larger pipes in some areas.

Total water produced was down 3.7 percent – because demand for irrigation decreased during rainy weather.

910

Growth in customers continued to climb with the installation of 910 new water meters, a 20-percent increase over FY2017, and 228 new PEP tanks, 23 percent more than the previous year.

## PUBLIC SAFETY



The City contracts with the Flagler County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement services.

Following an increase in serious traffic accidents including fatalities, the City Council funded five additional deputies for road patrol in 2018.

Flagler County Sheriff Rick Staly implemented three distinct and unique policing districts – the beaches, Palm Coast and western Flagler County – to ensure deputies are familiar with the communities they serve.

New in early 2019, the FCSO is adding License Plate Readers in Palm Coast to assist deputies in searching for a dangerous criminal, a missing person, or a stolen vehicle. LPRs notify the dispatch center and deputies in the field the moment an identified wanted license plate is read and pin-point a geo-location so that deputies can immediately respond.

The Palm Coast Fire Department responded to 10,014 total calls in FY2018. Of those, 772 were fire calls; 6,808 were medical; 698 were motor vehicle crashes; and 1,736 were general.

Four volunteer firefighters became full-time career firefighters through the department's innovative Internship Program. Volunteer interns receive training while they achieve fire certifications with the goal of a career in the Palm Coast Fire Department.

Public education and community outreach are high priorities. This year, 7,000 students were taught fire safety. Car seat technicians are available at all five fire stations to assist with the installation of car seats.

Students in Flagler Palm Coast High School's Fire Academy continue to participate in the department's Ride Along Program.



Longtime Fire Chief Mike Beadle retired and Deputy Chief Jerry Forte was sworn in as the City's fire chief at a Transfer of Command ceremony in September. The department announced a new Deputy Chief, Bradd Clark, in December.

## TRANSPORTATION

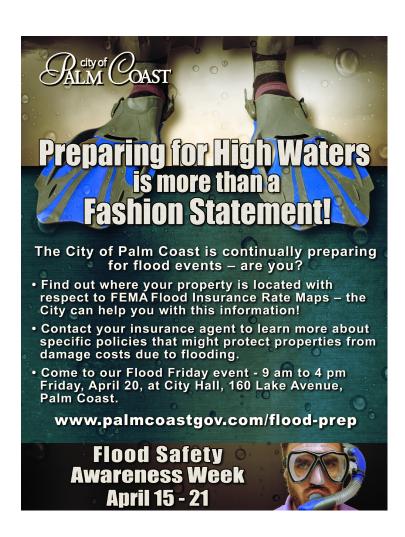
Palm Coast's No. 1 transportation improvement project is the four-laning of Old Kings Road North. The 3.6-mile stretch to be widened is from just south of Palm Coast Parkway northward to Forest Grove Drive.

The City's is finalizing rightof-way acquisition and project design in preparation for construction. The Florida Department of Transportation anticipates funding the first phase of construction in FY2020. Twelve projects were identified in a transportation corridor study to improve traffic flow and safety on Belle Terre Parkway and Belle Terre Boulevard, the those projects are in the design phase. Improvements to the intersection of Belle Terre and State Road 100 were completed.

Second-phase improvements to the City's traffic signal optimization program were completed, and a third phase is underway to include providing access to traffic signal video to the Flagler County Sheriff's Office.

A comprehensive Pavement Management System action plan was approved, with priority projects added to the City's 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan.

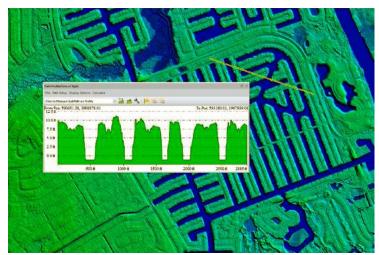
Intersection improvements at State Road 100 and Seminole Woods Boulevard were started, to include addition of a turn lane on Seminole Woods.



#### **FIRM**

FEMA updated its Flood Insurance Rate Maps, with the new FIRMs taking effect June 6, 2018. Many properties in Palm Coast were affected. For those owners now mandated to purchase flood insurance, most were notified by their insurance companies. City staff saw an increase in requests for flood zone determinations.





#### LiDAR

The City collaborated with St. Johns River Water Management District to bring Light Detection & Ranging (LiDAR) technology to Palm Coast in 2018. LiDAR is a high-resolution surveying and mapping technology. It is already being used by the City for floodplain management and for modeling to plan stormwater projects and also is available to engineers and surveying professionals working on private development.



#### **Stormwater Drainage Master Plan**

The City's stormwater drainage system was built by ITT in the 1970s and '80s, when the population was one tenth of its current size. After years of growth, an aging infrastructure and two hurricanes that put a spotlight on drainage issues, the City Council in 2018 approved an enhanced, comprehensive stormwater management plan to improve drainage system-wide.

A Master Plan is under way to look at the swales, ditches, canals, water control structures, pipes, and drainage basins and how they work together to protect homes and businesses from flooding. New solutions will focus on ditches and freshwater canals – because restoring them will help swales work better. Already, a more aggressive ditch maintenance program has started, and immediate priorities will address localized drainage issues in the W, E, F and R sections.

Projected costs will be provided during the Master Plan process, and computer modeling will help identify the most cost-effective options. The enhanced stormwater management program is being funded by revenues from the stormwater fee, which was increased Oct. 1, 2018.





# Improving Stormwater Drainage

2018 was a big year for reconstructing water control structures (aka weirs) that control water levels in the freshwater canals. Projects included the W-1 Weir across from Buddy Taylor Middle School on Belle Terre Parkway and the L-1 and K-1 Weirs off Sesame Boulevard in southern Palm Coast.

Through the City's bridge maintenance program, the rehabilitation of the Colorado Bridge over College Waterway was completed in early 2018.

The Public Works Department completed a major ditch enhancement project on a tributary between Ramblewood Drive and Rymfire Drive to improve drainage in the R Section.

#### **Trail Network**

With the addition of the Seminole Woods Path and Lakeview Path segments, the City continues to expand its trail network to ensure safe connections to numerous destinations. The additions traverse Palm Coast's most delicate scenery, promising an exhilarating experience for walkers and bicycle riders on a delightful exploration of numerous amenities.



#### **Seminole Woods Path**

With a goal of safely connecting neighborhoods to parks, schools, shopping, and Town Center, the Seminole Woods Pathway project in its entirety is almost complete with the construction of the last 1.7-mile Sesame Boulevard segment underway along with the Citation Boulevard design and construction in the near future.

#### **Lakeview Path**

The Lakeview Path project is a critical addition to the overall network. It now connects the Matanzas Woods neighborhood to existing trails along Matanzas Woods Boulevard, U.S. 1, Belle Terre Boulevard, and beyond. The path addition will also bring the installation of 42 street lights.



#### **Saving Energy in City Facilities**

In 2014, we conducted a performance audit of all City facilities to target opportunities to enhance conservation strategies by reducing energy and water consumption. Through the analysis, LED retrofits were determined to be the quickest return of investment while recognizing that our facilities are very efficient. To date, LED has been incorporated into City Hall, Community Center, Utility Administration Building, all Fire Stations and each of the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants.

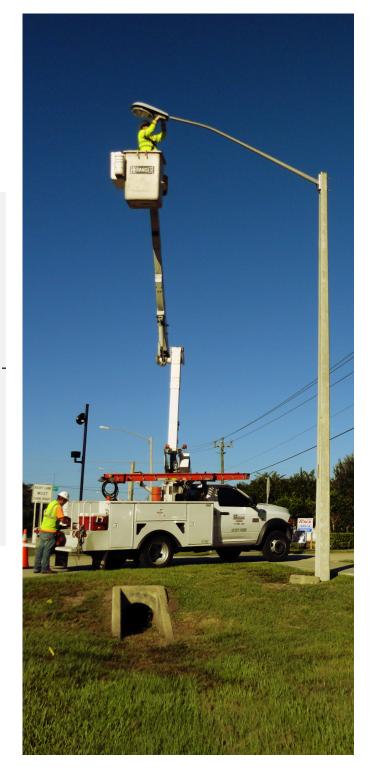

Take a ride across the City to appreciate our newest venture. Clean, renewable energy is being generated through a 217 solar paneled canopy providing shade for 26 vehicles at the Community Center. A second solar canopy is also located in Holland Park which is pictured above. A stop in Central park reveals three solar trees that were "planted" along the walkway. The trees have USB and power outlet connections that can be used by park visitors to charge mobile devices.

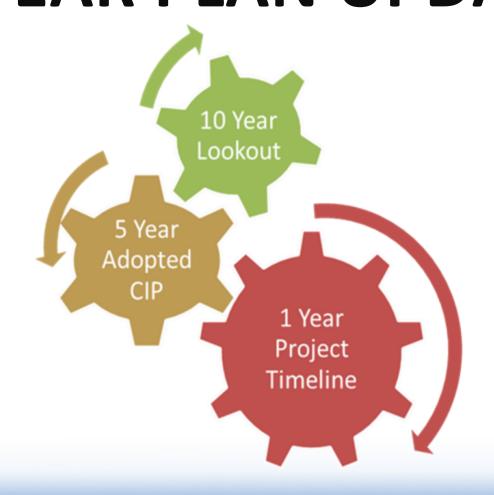

- B Minor cracks, spalls and scaling. No exposed or evidence of rebar corrosion
- C Some delamination, moderate cracking, some rebar exposure. Loss is incidental and does not significantly affect the strength and/or serviceability.
- D Advanced deterioration. Sufficient to warrant review of the impact on the strength and/or serviceability.

As one of Florida's newest cities and fastest growing in the late 2000s, our City incurred a heavy blow at the heart of the Recession. Unemployment became high, home ownership and business growth went down, and development for the anticipated Town Center stopped; yet, flash forward into 2018, the City has poised itself to becoming an innovative hub and world-class destination for inclusive growth. Home to almost 90,000 residents today and over 3,500 businesses, Palm Coast charted a new course this year at an accelerated rate.

From expanding municipal fiber, attracting new investments through an Opportunity Zone designation, launching an Innovation District and kick-starting a development incentive program are just a few of the major milestones the City reached this past year. And you know what the best part is? In less than a year of implementing all of these projects, the response of new businesses, developments and lifestyle opportunities for our community just keep rolling in. So with that, we are actively writing the next chapter for Palm Coast and proud to share 2018's highlights.

## CITY SERVICES

The City is committed to delivering high-quality services that give us a safe, functional community and allow for growth.

Providing high-quality services to our residents is our No. 1 job! With the rapid growth Palm Coast has experienced, the City strives to continually plan for the need for additional services such as an adequate supply of drinking water, road projects, street lights, drainage improvements, law enforcement and fire protection. The City Council updates the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) annually to provide a safe, functional community and allow for growth.

Big projects completed in 2018 include the opening of a second Wastewater Treatment Plant that adds capacity for our sewer system, adoption of a new street-lighting program for major roadways, implementation of new Flood Insurance Rate Maps for flood zones, transportation safety improvements and the launch of LiDAR, a high-resolution surveying and mapping technology, for assistance with drainage improvements and development.

And there's so much more planned in the coming year and beyond! Everything is designed to make our lives better and set the stage for positive growth and development.

## UTILITIES

The City's original Wastewater Treatment Plant on Utility Drive was built in the early 1970s. Its capacity was expanded over the years, to 6.83 million gallons/day, but it has nearly maxed out.

In 2018, Water Treatment Plant 2 opened off U.S. 1 in northwestern Palm Coast – adding 2 million gallons per day of additional sewer treatment capacity, which is needed for future growth. The new plant produces a highly treated effluent used for irrigation and groundwater recharge, and a reclaimed water main was installed for that purpose. In addition, a Master Pump Station was added in the Matanzas Woods area to support the wastewater system.

The City purchased the Mosquito Control District's former property on Utility Drive to provide office/training space and storage for the Utility Department.

A rate increase for water and wastewater (sewer) was implemented Oct. 1, 2018, to cover increased operating costs and infrastructure improvements.

The Utility took the first steps toward fixedbase meter reading. Installation of the infrastructure will begin in FY2019 and once complete, meters will be read remotely and a portal will be provided to allow customers to read and analyze their own water use data.

FY2018 was a very wet year, starting with Hurricane Irma – resulting in a 32-percent increase in wastewater flows. To reduce overflows caused by heavy rains, the City upgraded several pump stations and installed larger pipes in some areas.

Total water produced was down 3.7 percent – because demand for irrigation decreased during rainy weather.

910

Growth in customers continued to climb with the installation of 910 new water meters, a 20-percent increase over FY2017, and 228 new PEP tanks, 23 percent more than the previous year.

## PUBLIC SAFETY



The City contracts with the Flagler County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement services.

Following an increase in serious traffic accidents including fatalities, the City Council funded five additional deputies for road patrol in 2018.

Flagler County Sheriff Rick Staly implemented three distinct and unique policing districts – the beaches, Palm Coast and western Flagler County – to ensure deputies are familiar with the communities they serve.

New in early 2019, the FCSO is adding License Plate Readers in Palm Coast to assist deputies in searching for a dangerous criminal, a missing person, or a stolen vehicle. LPRs notify the dispatch center and deputies in the field the moment an identified wanted license plate is read and pin-point a geo-location so that deputies can immediately respond.

The Palm Coast Fire Department responded to 10,014 total calls in FY2018. Of those, 772 were fire calls; 6,808 were medical; 698 were motor vehicle crashes; and 1,736 were general.

Four volunteer firefighters became full-time career firefighters through the department's innovative Internship Program. Volunteer interns receive training while they achieve fire certifications with the goal of a career in the Palm Coast Fire Department.

Public education and community outreach are high priorities. This year, 7,000 students were taught fire safety. Car seat technicians are available at all five fire stations to assist with the installation of car seats.

Students in Flagler Palm Coast High School's Fire Academy continue to participate in the department's Ride Along Program.



Longtime Fire Chief Mike Beadle retired and Deputy Chief Jerry Forte was sworn in as the City's fire chief at a Transfer of Command ceremony in September. The department announced a new Deputy Chief, Bradd Clark, in December.

## TRANSPORTATION

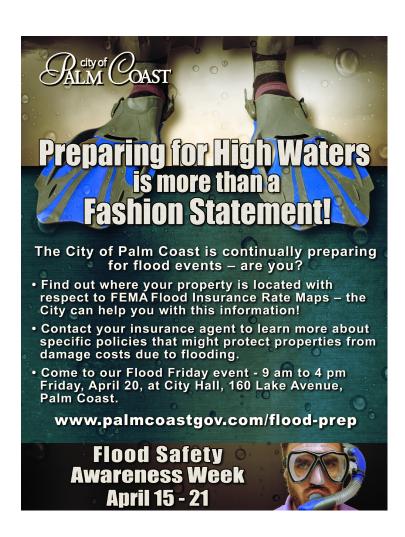
Palm Coast's No. 1 transportation improvement project is the four-laning of Old Kings Road North. The 3.6-mile stretch to be widened is from just south of Palm Coast Parkway northward to Forest Grove Drive.

The City's is finalizing rightof-way acquisition and project design in preparation for construction. The Florida Department of Transportation anticipates funding the first phase of construction in FY2020. Twelve projects were identified in a transportation corridor study to improve traffic flow and safety on Belle Terre Parkway and Belle Terre Boulevard, the those projects are in the design phase. Improvements to the intersection of Belle Terre and State Road 100 were completed.

Second-phase improvements to the City's traffic signal optimization program were completed, and a third phase is underway to include providing access to traffic signal video to the Flagler County Sheriff's Office.

A comprehensive Pavement Management System action plan was approved, with priority projects added to the City's 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan.

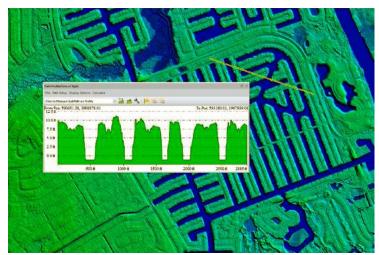
Intersection improvements at State Road 100 and Seminole Woods Boulevard were started, to include addition of a turn lane on Seminole Woods.



#### **FIRM**

FEMA updated its Flood Insurance Rate Maps, with the new FIRMs taking effect June 6, 2018. Many properties in Palm Coast were affected. For those owners now mandated to purchase flood insurance, most were notified by their insurance companies. City staff saw an increase in requests for flood zone determinations.





#### LiDAR

The City collaborated with St. Johns River Water Management District to bring Light Detection & Ranging (LiDAR) technology to Palm Coast in 2018. LiDAR is a high-resolution surveying and mapping technology. It is already being used by the City for floodplain management and for modeling to plan stormwater projects and also is available to engineers and surveying professionals working on private development.



#### **Stormwater Drainage Master Plan**

The City's stormwater drainage system was built by ITT in the 1970s and '80s, when the population was one tenth of its current size. After years of growth, an aging infrastructure and two hurricanes that put a spotlight on drainage issues, the City Council in 2018 approved an enhanced, comprehensive stormwater management plan to improve drainage system-wide.

A Master Plan is under way to look at the swales, ditches, canals, water control structures, pipes, and drainage basins and how they work together to protect homes and businesses from flooding. New solutions will focus on ditches and freshwater canals – because restoring them will help swales work better. Already, a more aggressive ditch maintenance program has started, and immediate priorities will address localized drainage issues in the W, E, F and R sections.

Projected costs will be provided during the Master Plan process, and computer modeling will help identify the most cost-effective options. The enhanced stormwater management program is being funded by revenues from the stormwater fee, which was increased Oct. 1, 2018.





## Improving Stormwater Drainage

2018 was a big year for reconstructing water control structures (aka weirs) that control water levels in the freshwater canals. Projects included the W-1 Weir across from Buddy Taylor Middle School on Belle Terre Parkway and the L-1 and K-1 Weirs off Sesame Boulevard in southern Palm Coast.

Through the City's bridge maintenance program, the rehabilitation of the Colorado Bridge over College Waterway was completed in early 2018.

The Public Works Department completed a major ditch enhancement project on a tributary between Ramblewood Drive and Rymfire Drive to improve drainage in the R Section.

#### **Trail Network**

With the addition of the Seminole Woods Path and Lakeview Path segments, the City continues to expand its trail network to ensure safe connections to numerous destinations. The additions traverse Palm Coast's most delicate scenery, promising an exhilarating experience for walkers and bicycle riders on a delightful exploration of numerous amenities.



#### **Seminole Woods Path**

With a goal of safely connecting neighborhoods to parks, schools, shopping, and Town Center, the Seminole Woods Pathway project in its entirety is almost complete with the construction of the last 1.7-mile Sesame Boulevard segment underway along with the Citation Boulevard design and construction in the near future.

#### **Lakeview Path**

The Lakeview Path project is a critical addition to the overall network. It now connects the Matanzas Woods neighborhood to existing trails along Matanzas Woods Boulevard, U.S. 1, Belle Terre Boulevard, and beyond. The path addition will also bring the installation of 42 street lights.



#### **Saving Energy in City Facilities**

In 2014, we conducted a performance audit of all City facilities to target opportunities to enhance conservation strategies by reducing energy and water consumption. Through the analysis, LED retrofits were determined to be the quickest return of investment while recognizing that our facilities are very efficient. To date, LED has been incorporated into City Hall, Community Center, Utility Administration Building, all Fire Stations and each of the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants.

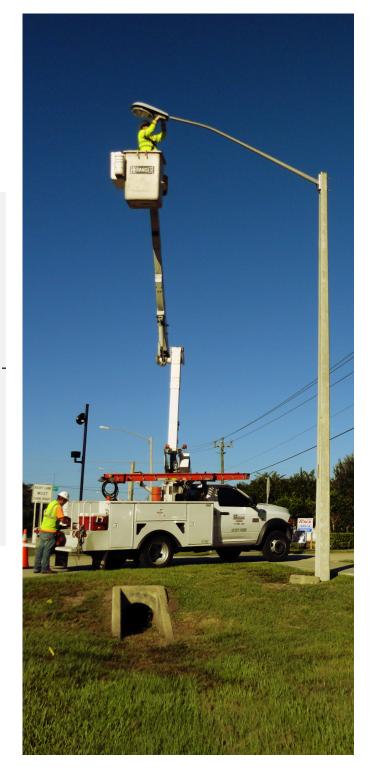
The final phase of the conversion has been completed by FPL. Staff is working on verifying the final conversions and updating the City's GIS inventory.

Partnering with FPL to support the SolarNow program was our perfect outcome. Adding FPL solar canopies and trees at our popular locations indicates how committed we are in the use of clean solar energy in Palm Coast.

Take a ride across the City to appreciate our newest venture. Clean, renewable energy is being generated through a 217 solar paneled canopy providing shade for 26 vehicles at the Community Center. A second solar canopy is also located in Holland Park which is pictured above. A stop in Central park reveals three solar trees that were "planted" along the walkway. The trees have USB and power outlet connections that can be used by park visitors to charge mobile devices.
