Pursuant to State law, the PLDRB is designated as the local Planning Agency. Responsibilities of the PLDRB include making recommendations to the City Council regarding the Comprehensive Plan, Land Development Code, and development applications. Further, the PLDRB acts as final authority (subject to appeal to the City Council) on special exceptions.

Section 2-2(a)(1) of the City's Code of Ordinances says, "All appointees shall be limited to two

consecutive terms of office on the same body unless the City Council by a four -fifths vote determines that it is in the best interests of the City to appoint a person to a term of office exceeding that limitation."

Section 2-2(a)(5) of the City's Code of Ordinances provides, "In appropriate circumstances the City Council shall make every reasonable effort to ensure that City Council Districts are as equally represented as practicable; provided, however, that the City's local planning agency (Planning and Land Development Regulation Board) shall have at least one appointed from each City Council District."

UPDATE FROM THE OCTOBER 4, 2022 BUSINESS MEETING

This item was heard by City Council at their October 4, 2022 Business Meeting. There were no changes suggested to this item.

ORIGINAL BACKGROUND FROM THE OCTOBER 4, 2022 BUSINESS MEETING

This is an application to amend the zoning map designation for 9.81 +/- acres of real property from Suburban Estate (EST-1) to Public/Semipublic (PSP) zoning district. The project is located at the intersection of Old Kings Road and Oak Trails Boulevard. The subject property was purchased in July 2018 by Kings Business Center, LLC from Palm Coast Holdings, Inc. A portion of the parcels were rezoned in 2018 from COM-1 to MFR-2, which is the existing zoning. The portion of the parcels that are part of this rezoning application were not affected.

<u>Public Participation:</u> The developer notified the neighboring property owners via standard USPS mail of an upcoming neighborhood meeting that was held on August 29, 2022, at 6:00 pm at the Palm Coast Community Center, 305 Palm Coast Parkway NE, Palm Coast, Florida. The developer erected a city provided sign on Oak Trails Blvd., notifying the public of all upcoming public hearings. Newspaper ads will be run approximately two weeks before each of the three public hearings.

On September 20, 2022, PLDRB voted 6-0 to recommend approval to City Council.

<u>Summary</u>: Staff has reviewed this project in accordance with 2.05.05 & 2.06.03 of the Land Development Code and find that it is in compliance. The project is not contrary to the public interest; it is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, and it has compatibility with proximate uses.

Background :

The City's existing 401a Retirement Plan and 457 Deferred Compensation Plan require the appointment of plan administrators. On or about April 1, 2000, the City established a retirement plan fiduciary committee in order to be responsible for various administrative functions with respect to the retirement plans for the benefit of the employees of the City, and act as plan administrators.

As authorized under Resolution 2012-98, in recognition of the committee members' various administrative functions and fiduciary responsibilities, without additional compensation, the City has agreed to indemnify the committee members. The indemnification is in respect to any and all claims, losses, damages and expenses which may be incurred as a result of, or arising out of, the performance of the members' duties as part of this committee.

Pursuant to Plan Resolution, as of August 21, 2020, the positions that serve in this capacity are the City Manager, Financial Services Director, Human Resources Director, Public Works Director, and the Fire Chief.

Resolution 2021-122 approved the indemnity agreement between each member of the City of Palm Coast Retirement Plan Fiduciary Committee. As the current Fire Chief has announced his retirement from the City of Palm Coast, the newly appointed Fire Chief should be indemnified in this role as a member of the City of Palm Cost Plan Fiduciary Committee.

As the City Manager is no longer an interim position, a new agreement should be executed removing that designation from the title.

Background:

This item is for standard operations.

In 2008, the City provided affordable and enjoyable options for cultural, educational, recreational, and leisure-time opportunities with the construction of Waterfront Park. This park serves as connector to other public park attractions. An original Master Plan of Waterfront Park noted a dual designation as a waterfront amenity/park while also recognizing it as a trailhead. The "Plan" highlighted numerous amenities, many of which exist today.

Already constructed as of today and in use are:

- Parking lot
- Picnic Pavilions (three along the waterfront)
- Playground
- Fishing Pier
- Restroom facilities
- Utilities and other essential infrastructure
- Shoreline stabilization along the Intracoastal Waterway Trail (FIND Property) and along Waterfront Park

Not constructed:

• Boat docking and launching capabilities

On April 19, 2005, City Council gave approval to submit a grant application to Florida Inland Navigation District (FIND) for design and permitting funding for a double boat launch facility with an access channel to the Intracoastal Waterway, and included associated paved trailer parking, docks, shoreline stabilization, and a fishing pier at Waterfront Park. The City of Palm Coast was awarded the grant with an estimated total cost of \$414,026.00. On April 25, 2006, City Council entered into the grant agreement (FL-PC-05-12) for the amount \$130,810.00 match for a total project cost of \$261,620.00 after the original cost estimate was revisited.

On February 19, 2008, City Council gave approval to submit a grant application to FIND for Construction of Phase I with an estimated cost of \$360,000.00. On November 4, 2008, City Council entered into the grant agreement (FL-PC-08-14) for the amount \$296,750.00 match for

a total project cost of \$593,500.00 after the original cost estimate was revisited.

On April 7, 2020, City Council gave approval to submit a grant application to further enhance the recreational uses within the park and contiguous waterways. The proposed enhancements include a non-motorized boat access through a floating pier structure, shoreline stabilization, and dredging activities. The improvements are associated with a larger conceptual plan to expand parking and traffic circulation within the site. Ample right-of-way, stabilized grass parking along the north side of Waterfront Park Road will support any vehicles with trailers. The project will enhance park users' experiences by highlighting connections to other regional attractions via water-based activities.

City staff obtained a FIND grant for multi-year funding for this project. FIND allows multi-year approved projects to submit up to 3 requests. The City has identified the multi-year components described below, and shown on the attached graphic as Phase I, Part A, Part B, and Part C.

- Part A Sitework, Boat Launch, & Dock Access
- Part B Dredging & Shoreline Modification
- Part C Coquina Revetment & Floating Dock

In the future, the City intends to submit a new project grant application to construct a parking lot to serve the new water access. The estimated total construction cost for Phase I is \$1,100,000.00 of which \$533,000.00 will be requested through FIND as part of their grant program.

On October 20, 2020, City Council entered into a grant agreement (FL-PC-20-31) for a not-to-exceed amount of \$146,000.00 for Phase I, Part A of the project.

On November 16, 2021, City Council entered into a grant agreement (FL-PC-31-32) for a not-to-exceed amount of \$211,250.00 for Phase 1, Part B of the project.

On March 15, 2022, City Council approved the submittal of a FIND waterways assistance grant program application for the construction of Waterfront Park Phase A, Part 3 of the project.

On August 17, 2022, City Staff advertised this project (ITB-SWE-22-66) and received two (2) bids.

This item is to approve execution of Phase A, Part 3 grant agreement (FL-PC-22-33), approve the award of construction contract to the low bidder Saboungi Construction, Inc., of Ormond Beach, FL for \$1,252,450.00, approve a Work Order in the amount of \$29,030.00 with CPH Engineers for construction phase engineering services, as well as approval of a 10% project contingency of \$128,148.00, for a total of \$1,409,628.00.

This project is in the 5-year Capital Improvement Plan and is budgeted in FY23 and through a multi-year FIND agreements.

On December 6, 2021, Flagler County adopted Ordinance 2021-09, known as the Comprehensive Impact Fee Ordinance. The ordinance includes the adoption of an impact fee to fund the capital costs related to the provision of law enforcement services.

The County, through funding to the Flagler County Sheriff, has a responsibility to provide law enforcement services within both the unincorporated and incorporated areas of the County. Additional capital facilities and equipment provided by the County that are used for calls for service for the prevention of criminal violations and the apprehension of criminals are necessary to maintain the standard of service currently provided.

The ordinance concludes that future growth should contribute its fair share to the cost of improvements and additions to the law enforcement system that are required to accommodate the impact generated by such growth.

The ordinance requests that each municipality consider an interlocal agreement for the purpose of collecting such fees: "The Law Enforcement Impact Fees shall be imposed in all unincorporated areas of the County and within all municipalities that consent to the imposition of the law enforcement impact fees within their municipal boundaries".

The adopted impact fee for a single-family home is \$218 per dwelling unit. A complete schedule of fees is included in Section 17-62 of the ordinance.

Through the Strategic Action Plan, City Council identified a priority for the westward expansion.

A5. The westward expansion is guided by master planning for smart, managed, growth. Economic development is driven by Town Center regional destination initiatives. Economic growth and community marketing are supported by competitive youth sport activity centers catering to young athletes, families, and fans from regional and distant locations.

The Sports Complex feasibility study will determine the market demand and feasibility of developing a sports complex. The City suspects there may be a growing need for high quality venues to host regional, state-wide and even national sporting events and at the same time providing excellent facilities for resident use. The City presently has facilities that accomplish some of these same purposes and wishes to understand the impacts of a new complex on enhanced opportunities to produce economic development through visitor spending.

Background:

This item is for standard operations.

This agenda item was originally presented to Council on March 1, 2022 and was approved under Resolution 2022-26. However, due to changes in scope and cost, the project was delayed. Utility Staff later revised the scope, reviewed previously submitted proposals, and decided to resubmit this project to Council for approval.

On average, underground fuel tanks should be replaced every 25 years. The City of Palm Coast currently has three underground diesel fuel storage tanks that provide fuel for our generators. The fuel tanks have been inspected against this metric and have reached the point where replacement is the most prudent course of action. The Utility Department is seeking to replace the underground fuel storage tanks with state-of-the-art above-ground systems that use inventory monitoring with leak detection capabilities at Water Treatment Plants #1 and #2, and Wastewater Treatment Plant #1.

City staff is recommending piggybacking the General Services Administration (GSA) Federal Supply Service contract #GA07F-011GA with Core Engineered Solutions, Inc., for the fuel tank replacement project. Piggybacking an existing competitively bid contract has many advantages as City Staff can immediately leverage the contract pricing without conducting a lengthy formal bid. City Staff can save a significant amount of time while leveraging the best value for the City.

The Fiscal Year 2023 Budget includes available funding appropriated by City Council for the fuel tank replacements. The total cost of this project is \$1,377,545.43 plus a 10% contingency of \$125,231.40 for a total allocation of \$1,377,545.43.

Currently, the need to increase flow capacity through the corridor exists to reduce or eliminate tank trucking from the master pump stations during high demand days. Recently, McKim & Creed, the City's existing				

Existing sanitary sewer force mains along Old Kings Rd (OKR) serve to provide flows from several master sewer pump stations. A section of the OKR corridor from Utility Drive to approximately two (2) miles south, have had additional force mains added over the past thirty (30) years to accommodate increased flow demand from development. Currently, the need to increase flow capacity through the corridor exists to reduce or eliminate tank trucking from the master pump stations during high demand days. Recently, McKim & Creed, the City's existing consultant, completed a feasibility study and force main sizing needs analysis. The feasibility study and analysis was for upsizing force main capacity along that section of OKR and to the receiving Wastewater Treatment Facility No.1 at the end of Utility Drive. The study indicated that a 24-inch diameter force main is needed, approximately 1.5 miles total, of which approximately 1.1 miles of the force main will be along OKR. The proposed force main will allow the elimination of the existing smaller diameter force mains and provide enough flow capacity for buildout demand. The specific design location of the proposed force main will be coordinated with future OKR widening plans.

Under the existing contract (RFSQ-CD-19-12) with McKim & Creed, staff negotiated a scope and fee, in a not-to-exceed amount of \$299,736.00, for design and construction engineering services for the Old Kings Road Force Main project. City staff has determined that the cost for the engineering services is reasonable, fair, and consistent with these types of services for a project of this size and scope.

Funds for this project are budgeted out of the Utility Capital Improvement Fund and are included in the 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan.

Currently, the City has a master services contract with Aquatic Management Plus, LLC to conduct freshwater canal spraying to control aquatic weed growth. Aquatic Management Plus, LLC, has held multiple contracts with the City of Palm Coast over the past 12 years. Aquatic Management Plus, LLC will only spray state-approved herbicides, using multiple pieces of equipment to access all ditch areas.

City staff requested additional ditch spraying services from Aquatic Management Plus, LLC. This additional scope of work includes an initial and secondary treatment of all ditches within City easements and rights-of-way.

Under the existing contract (RFP-CD-18-60), staff negotiated a scope and fee not-to-exceed \$178,283.08 for the ditch weed control. During times of extreme wet weather or abnormal events such as tropical storms, hurricanes, or tornadoes, it may become necessary for the City to supplement the City tank truck fleet with outside contractors. These contractors are needed to assist the Wastewater Collection System with pumping excess inflow/infiltration ground and surface water to reduce the possibility of sanitary sewer overflows in the wastewater collection and pumping system.

City staff advertised ITB-UT-22-68 emergency tank trucking of wastewater collection system on an as needed basis in accordance with the City's Purchasing Policy. The City received three bids which were responsive and responsible. The Notice of Intent to Award and Project Bid Overview are attached to this agenda item.

Staff recommends City Council approve master service agreements with Flagler Septic Systems, All Daytona Septic Tank Service, Inc., and Brownies Septic & Plumbing. The services will be utilized as needed, and as most advantageous to the City.

This contract will be used for the emergency tank trucking of the wastewater collection system on an as-needed basis during Fiscal Year 2023 utilizing utility continency funding.

The City's Wastewater Treatment Division utilizes liquid polymer in the dewatering of waste sludge from the process before being disposed. Both dewatering processes utilize a positive charged polymer as a flocculant for dewatering. This process is necessary to maintain the balance between the treatment process and the wasting process.

City staff advertised and solicited bids in ITB-UT-22-75 for Wastewater Residuals Management Services in accordance with the City's Purchasing Policy. One (1) bid was received. City staff recommends entering into an agreement with the sole bidder, Polydyne Inc., at \$1.82 per pound. The estimated annual cost for both treatment plants is \$205,000.00.

City staff will schedule the services on an as-needed basis using budgeted funds appropriated by City Council. The Fiscal Year 2023 Budget includes funding within the Utility Fund to pay for these services. Staff estimates the City will expend approximately \$205,000.00 annually under this contract.
