Background:

National Water Safety Month's history of highlighting water awareness and swim safety started in June 2003, when the World Waterpark Association (WWA) launched its National Water Safety Week. People celebrated this water awareness week for four years.

In May 2007, the National Recreation and Park Association, (NRPA) which had been celebrating National Aquatics Week in July from 2004 to 2006, decided, along with the WWA, that a month-long water safety initiative in May would be best because it is when swim activity increases across the country. That is when National Water Safety Month was officially born.

In May 2009, the Association of Pool & Spa Professionals (now the Pool & Hot Tub Alliance) joined the partnership, adding waterparks, public pools, and backyard pools to the monthly water safety initiative. Finally, in May 2010, the American Red Cross joined the National Water Safety Month coalition as a key partner.

The City of Palm Coast Parks & Recreation Department strives to promote water safety in all aquatics, environments, and activities. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), eleven people die from unintentional drowning every day. Drowning is the third leading cause of unintentional death for all ages and the second leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 14 years. Our aquatics staff provides lifesaving swim lessons to all ages, from children to adults, as well as courses for the more advanced swimmer. You are never too old to learn how to swim!

Subject APPOINT A CITY COUNCIL LIAISON TO THE FLAGLER COUNTY TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED LOCAL COORDINATING BOARD

Background:

For 20 years, the Flagler County Council on Aging (FCCOA) provided transportation service in Flagler County. In 1979, transportation delivery began as a social service to the senior population. On July 15,1982, the Flagler County Board of County Commissioners adopted the Transportation Disadvantaged Plan for Flagler County and designated the FCCOA as the Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC). In 1983, Flagler County Transport (FCT) was established as a department of the FCCOA to provide coordinated transportation services in the County. In creating this new department, the FCCOA's charter was amended to include the provision of Transportation Disadvantaged services as part of the corporate mission. In 1984, FCT began to coordinate all county resources and execute Purchase of Service Agreements with other agencies which sponsor transportation for their eligible clients.

In late 2003, Flagler County began the process of transitioning to take over all Flagler Senior Services operations and merge them with County government. On March 1, 2004, the Flagler County Board of County Commissioners became the Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) for the Flagler TD program. On April 15, 2009, the Flagler County Board of County Commissioners was reappointed as the CTC through 2014. On May 14, 2014, once again the Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged reappointed Flagler County Transit as the CTC through 2019, with an extension through 2020. The Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged approved a five-year agreement at their meeting in June 2020.

Flagler County has requested a Council Member from the City of Palm Coast be appointed to the Flagler County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board. This Board oversees the important public transportation system for disadvantaged citizens in Flagler County. Members of this Board include Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC) coordinator, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Public Education, Veterans Services, Department of Elder Affairs, Agency for Health Care, Vocational Rehab. and many others. The board essentially reviews operations and ensures FCPT is achieving the mission of the Transportation Disadvantaged program: providing safe, reliable, efficient and courteous transit services to our disadvantaged community.

The overall mission of Florida's Transportation Disadvantaged program is to ensure the availability of efficient, cost-effective, and quality transportation services for transportation disadvantaged persons. People served by the program include those who because of physical or mental disability, income status, or age are unable to transport themselves or to purchase transportation and are, therefore, dependent upon others to obtain access to health care,

employment, education, shopping, social activities, or other life-sustaining activities, or children who are handicapped or high-risk or at-risk as defined in Section 411.202, Florida Statutes.

There is currently a vacancy for a Citizen Advocate/Non-User and since City of Palm Coast citizens make extensive use of this system (18,488 trips in the most recent quarter) a representative from the city is warranted.

City staff and consultant, Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc., recommend a stormwater fee adjustment based on an updated rate study analysis. This adjustment is necessary to support future needs, stormwater system goals, and level service standards.

UPDATE FROM THE APRIL 11, 2023, WORKSHOP

This item was heard by City Council at their April 11, 2023, workshop. City Council requested the following:

- Remove Right-of-way mowing costs
- Remove Priority 5, 2 additional swale crews and associated staff & equipment
- Look into phasing programs and/or projects to reduce overall rate increase
- Modify the program to limit the FY24 ERU rate increase to generate an additional four million dollars

UPDATE FROM THE FEBRUARY 14, 2023, WORKSHOP

This item was heard by City Council at their February 14, 2023, Workshop. City Council requested that staff prepare a cost-benefit analysis of bringing contract services in-house and evaluate the feasibility of a user rate option. Updates to this item were presented during this meeting.

ORIGINAL BACKGROUND FROM THE FEBRUARY 14, 2023, WORKSHOP

In 2018 the city completed, and City Council adopted a comprehensive rate study. This study was to evaluate the adequacy of stormwater rates necessary to pay for system operations, enhanced levels of maintenance, critical capital repairs and upgrades, and ongoing replacement of fleet and equipment. The rate study findings resulted in a recommended rate increase based on enhanced operations and a capital plan. The plan accelerated capital repairs and improvements, as well as maintenance activities for the citywide stormwater system. The adopted rate was phased in incrementally through FY24. Adopted rate increases included 8.2% for FY23 which was implemented on October 1, 2022, and an additional 7.5% scheduled for implementation in FY24. An annual indexing provision was also adopted to increase rates

beyond FY24 based on the change in the consumer price index (CPI), but not less than 2% annually. Currently, the CPI has increased by 8.2% from October 2021 through September 2022.

In May of 2022, Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc., was contracted to perform a review of the Stormwater Enterprise Fund and provide a new rate study analysis to support the future needs and level of service of the Stormwater Utility.

ORIGINAL BACKGROUND FROM THE AUGUST 16, 2022, COUNCIL BUSINESS MEETING

Twenty years ago, Flagler County (the "County") and the City of Palm Coast (the "City") were in conflict over territorial rights for water and sewer service. The territory in question was the area of Old Kings Road south of SR 100. By 2007, the County and the City, along with other utility owners, agreed to settle their various disputes in the Settlement Agreement. The Agreement defined which area of Old Kings Road each party would service. It also contained a clause that the city would install a water main and meter to a specified point. At that specified point the County would connect and receive bulk water for resale to its customer base.

In 2018, the City of Palm Coast and Flagler County were approached by property owners along the Old Kings Road Service Area with potential plans for future development. As such, the City and the County entered negotiations for a revised Interlocal Agreement, which would have laid the foundation to develop a cooperative effort to provide a regional approach to address water and sewer service along Old Kings Road South to properties in the City and in unincorporated County effectuating the terms of the 2007 agreement. That agreement would have provided that the parties would continue to work together and enter into a future Interlocal Agreement. However, an agreement was not reached.

Since that time, the County sold their utility to Florida Governmental Utility Authority (FGUA). Staff negotiated an agreement with FGUA, which was approved by Council on August 16, 2022. The agreement specifies that the City will provide bulk water and sewer services to the FGUA. This agreement also grants the City service rights for the territories annexed after the Settlement Agreement. The City would acquire the current property which FGUA utilizes for the treatment facility. This site would potentially become the City's future WWTP 3 site and would

enable future wastewater service in the southeastern portion of the City. The agreement also allows for the reduction/elimination of small package treatment facilities in the area, a benefit that would reduce/eliminate the discharge of wastewater effluent into Bulow Creek.

CURRENT PROPOSED AGENDA ITEM

The current agenda item proposes an agreement with Radiance Community Development District (CDD) for Radiance to design, permit, solicit bids, and construct the needed potable water, sanitary sewer, reclaimed water, and triplex pump station infrastructure improvements and associated appurtenances. Radiance will adhere to the requirements in the Interlocal Interconnection Agreement provisions previously agreed to between the City and FGUA, specifically in Sections 4.1 through 4.6. The design related cost funding is shared per the prior Interlocal Agreement with FGUA.

City staff is requesting \$1,123,700.00 to cover the cost of the City funded portion and a project contingency. Funding is provided for in the city's Five-Year Capital plan. FGUA will commit to their share of the funding prior to the project design moving forward.

In an effort to improve plant process operations and restore lost capacity, staff is requesting approval for U.S. Submergent Technologies to remove sand, grit, and debris from the bottom of critical process equipment that has accumulated over the past five years. During periods of high flow due to rain events, tropical storms, and hurricanes, the screening and grit removal systems at the head of the plant are unable to remove all this material. As this material enters the process, it settles in the biological tanks and reduces valuable capacity. U.S. Submergent Technologies uses a process called Sedivision to locate and measure the areas of buildup in the tanks. The next process will remove the undesirable material and filter, while returning the liquid back into the process. This allows the cleaning to take place without removing to biological tank from the process. It is not possible to remove a tank from service due to our increased flows due to growth.

City staff is recommending piggybacking the City of Orlando contract (IFB18-0255) with U.S. Submergent Technologies, LLC through June 10, 2023, for structure cleaning services at Wastewater Treatment Plant 1. Piggybacking existing competitively bid contracts is advantageous since the pricing is generally better than what the City could obtain on its own, and the City does not incur the expense and delay of soliciting a bid.

Since the underlying contract is an agreement on a per unit price basis, City staff is requesting approval based on available approved budgeted funds appropriated by City Council. The Fiscal Year 2023 Budget includes available funding in the City's Wastewater Operations capital funding. City staff estimates that the City will expend approximately \$177,650.00 under this piggyback contract.

City staff is recommending approval for the asphalt milling and resurfacing of five arterial roadways, Belle Terre Pkwy., East Hampton Blvd., Matanzas Woods Pkwy., Seminole Woods Blvd., and Sesame Blvd. Work on these arterials will include asphalt base repair and temporary and permanent roadway striping. Work will also include an add alternate bid for asphalt milling and resurfacing, replacement of roadway striping, and adjustment of water valves or manholes on a list of residential roads.

The City advertised the project (ITB-SWE-23-28) and received three (3) bids that were deemed to be responsive and from responsible bidders.

The project design engineer and city staff recommend award of the contract, to include base bid and bid alternate #1 to the low bidder, P&S Paving Inc., for \$5,929,613.35. In addition, staff is requesting approval of a work order with GAI Consultants Inc., in a not-to-exceed amount of \$243,220.00 for construction engineering services (CEI). GAI was awarded the contract on RFSQ-SWE-23-29. Based on past experience with similar construction projects, staff is requesting a 14% project contingency in the amount of \$864,196.67 in case of unforeseen circumstances and/or unknown conditions, for a total project cost of \$7,037,030.02.

Funds for this project are budgeted out of the Street Improvement Fund.
